BOSTON'S NEW HOCKEY ARENA COMPLETED

Seating Accommodation for
Five Thousand—Fine Ice
Surface—Artificial
Ice System.

Boston, Dec. 30.—The New Arena St. Botolph St., which has been in the course of construction for six months will be thrown open to the public Saturday. It is a more elaborate building than the old one, burned down several years ago. It is one which not only is to be used for ice hockey and boxing, but is available also for athletic meets and conventions. It is built of concrete and the steel chairs provided will accommodate approximately 5000.

While the foundations of the old Arena were used in the rebuilding, which means that the dimensions of length and breadth are unchanged, a glance at the structure gives the impression that it is larger by many square feet than the former building. The playing surface will not be as long as in the old days, 220 feet. It is 90 feet wide and an ideal area, hockey players claim, for that sport.

The directors claim that it will be possible to have hockey played one night and hold either a boxing tournament or a track meet the following one. This is possible through a system installed for not only making the ice, but also doing away with it. These conditions prevail at Philadelphia. The plan is novel in this part of the country. It will be Boston's home of indoor sports. The space is oval shape. There is one row of boxes all the way around and the seats in the corners are so arranged that it has the appearance of the bowl in the Harvard Stadium.

There will be offices and ample dressing rooms, more spacious than in the old Arena. All in all, it is a big improvement over the old structure. The sides are of glass, and this will permit the freezing of the ice more readily than under the old conditions when the walls were of brick.

There are two big ice-making machines, a 100 ton one equaling the capacity of the machine which served in the old Arena. The other is a reserve machine of 90 tons capacity for use in only extremely cold weather. There are also regular and auxiliary pumps.

EUGENICS TO BREAK RECORDS

Chicago, Dec. 31.—Eugenics, followed by generations of athletes, would result in lowering every athletic mark on record, William H. Ball of New York declared today before the Athletic Research Society.

"The problem of athletics is the elimination of fatigue," he said. "This with the science of eugenics properly applied, will mean that we may anticipate new records by the sons of famous athletes."



GERMANY'S ARMY DOES NOT RECOGNIZE THE REPUBLIC

It Still Remains a State Within a State---The ex-Kaiser's Hopes for a Return of the Hohenzollern Dynasty are Not Built on Sand---Prussia Faced Similar Crisis After Battle of Jena.

Berlin, Dec. 30.—That the ex-Kaiser's hopes of the return of the Hohenzollern dynasty are not built on sand, but on the rock that for more than half a century has been the very keystone of Germany—the German Army—was quite plainly indicated by Herr Scheidemann in his recent speech in the Reichstag, when he accused Herr Gessler, Minister of Defence, of being nothing but a mere shadow, while the real power was in the hands of the Chief of the General Staff, General Seeckt.

treaty of Versailles, the German army today still remains a state within the state which does not submit to the ordinary laws nor even pretend to recognize the German Republic. The explanation of this fact, which contains the greatest danger to the future peace of the world, lies in the peculiar character of the German mind and the knowledge of the German people of the history of their country. Once before, only a little more than a century ago, after the battle of Jena, Prussia passed through a crisis which in many ways resembles the present situation. At that time the resurrection from the country's deepest degradation came within seven years of the battle of Leipzig, and the hope that history will repeat itself and in the same manner—through the German army—is deeply embedded in the German breast.

The thought of vindication through force of arms is to be found in practically every German. At the present time the German national party is the only one to voice it openly, but it lies dormant even in the most radical Socialist.

The growth of this thought for revenge for the defeat suffered in 1918 may be measured through an infinite multitude of little details. The passive resistance shown against the attempts of the present government loyally to carry out the conditions of the peace treaty is only made possible through the cooperation of the will of millions of individuals, and in a number of cases the resistance has already passed from the passive to the active stage.

That the German people through the signature of its government and the ratification of the treaty by its elected assembly has bound itself to live up to the treaty signifies nothing to the average German Jesuitic mind and already there are those who do not see why they should not make this fact clear even now.
