

ORANGE SAUCE.

In the top vessel of a double boiler cream one-fourth cup of butter add the yolks of four eggs, one at a time beating them in thoroughly; add gradually one-fourth cup of sugar and one-third cup of cream; cook over hot water until mixture is slightly thickened; then add one-fourth cup of strained orange juice and one-half tablespoon of lemon juice. Serve in a hot sauce boat.

MEASUREMENTS.

There is no such thing as "good luck" or "bad luck" in cooking if the recipe measurements are absolutely accurate and the housewife understands the range. Although many authorities advocate measuring out beforehand all ingredients needed for the dish to be prepared, any practical woman will readily see that this makes necessary the use of too many measuring utensils and dishes. It is much better always to keep standard half-pint measuring cups in the sugar and flour cans, teaspoons in the salt jar or tea canister and tablespoons in the coffee can, corn starch jar and so on. During the average morning's cooking it should not be necessary to use more than two extra measuring cups, one for ingredients not already provided with cups, the other for fats and liquids. There should also be a teaspoon and a tablespoon each for dry and liquid ingredients.

The equipment for accurate measuring is as follows: One standard half pint tin or aluminum measuring cup one standard half pint glass measuring cup, one standard half pint pitcher cup for use in making mayonnaise and the like, each divided into thirds and quarters; one quart aluminum or tin cup, divided into quarters and standard tablespoons and teaspoons.


To measure a cupful of any dry ingredient, fill it full and level off the top with a knife, taking care not to pack it in. A spoonful should be never be "rounded" unless specified. To measure half an ordinary teaspoonful fill it level, scraping it off, and divide the contents into halves lengthwise. Flour, confectioner's sugar, baking soda and any other ingredient which is liable to lump should be sifted before measuring, while mustard baking powder, etc., which settle from standing in the can, should be stirred to lighten.

A cupful or spoonful of any liquid is as much as the utensil will hold without running over. All fats, as butter, oleomargarine, lard or drippings are packed down and levelled before measuring. When they are to be melted it is specified in the recipe. Sixteen tablespoonfuls level of anything will fill a half pint cup. In preparing a portion of a recipe this rule will be found a great help.

CHILDREN OF FRANCE DESIRE COSTLY TOYS

Paris, Dec. 28—"Boys will hardly look at soldiers nowadays," said the manager of the Paradise des Enfants. "What we are chiefly selling now are complicated mechanical models worked by electricity from a plug in the wall."

He showed a twelve-foot long model of a railway junction complete with viaduct, station, and signal boxes. The trains, the headlights, the model are lamps, and signals are all worked by the electric light current of the house. The rolling stock is even fitted up inside with tiny restaurant tables. The price is \$500.

For about the same sum a boy of nautical tastes can be presented with a ten-foot long model of a torpedo-boat destroyer, built to scale and exact in every essential detail. A racing motor boat, built on the latest Monte Carlo lines, which can do ten miles an hour, costs \$300.

The trousseaux sold with the 1920 dolls fill a trunk as big as an ordinary suit-case and include not only costumes for morning afternoon and evening but also hand-worked lingerie and even mode sets of jewels consisting of pearl necklaces, bangles, and lognettes.

Some of the dolls have an internal device which, when they topple over, causes them to emit a good imitation of a baby's whimper.

CAKES FOR VIENNA'S POOR

Vienna, Dec. 28—A new cake bakery established by the American "Aid the Children Committee" was opened by Captain Gardner Richardson, head of the Committee. The model bakery, which will provide 300,000 cakes for starving children per week, was inspected by the city authorities, who expressed their thanks for the generous American help.

BURNHAM KNOCKS THE GOVERNMENT

Peterboro, Ont., Dec. 30—J. H. Burnham, ex-M. P., who has reverted to the old Conservative party, has got his campaign in West Peterboro well under way. Today he gave out the following statement over his own signature:

"A story is going around to the effect that since I will not go to the government, the government may endorse me as their candidate. It is not likely but whether likely or not I will not accept government endorsement. I hope that statement is plain.

"I believe that this government is the creature of some big schemes now floating in the air, and I believe it is a positive danger to Canada.

"It shows that it will stop at nothing. Its origin is one of the mysteries of the day. I am unalterably opposed to this combination at Ottawa, and will never rest until I see those who are attempting to wreck the old parties, whose backing and policies are known and understood are themselves wrecked."

WOMEN OF ARGENTINE THE BEST DRESSED

London, Dec. 29—"Britain is getting a firm footing in the rich markets of South America," said Sir Woodman Burbidge, managing director of the famous Harrods department store in London, on his return recently from Argentina, where Harrods have a flourishing Buenos Aires branch. "American business is making big strides there also, but there is plenty of room for both the United States and Great Britain in this wealthy market.

"Raw material costs may decrease but I do not think wages are going to show any downward tendency, and I see no reason why they should. In the Argentine merchants are so anxious to get British goods that they are willing to pay for them ten per cent higher prices than for other foreign products, chiefly because of the generally higher quality.

"Argentine women are now leaders in the world of fashion and are better dressed than the women of the United States, France or Britain. They are buying nothing but the best British cloth.

"Production in Great Britain has recently been on the decline owing to the constant state of unrest in the labor world, and the consequent reluctance of manufacturers to accept foreign contracts; but as soon as we tie down—as I believe we are now beginning to do—we shall be fully able to hold our own in the battle for world-trade."
