THE REPUBLICAN MAJORITY STEADILY CLIMBING UP

Believed Now That Harding Will Have 350 Votes in the Electoral College—Republicans Will Control Senate and Congress—Champ Clark, Former Speaker, Among the Slain.

New York, Nov. 3.—The crest of the Republican election wave, both presidential and congressional, continued rising tonight as belated returns filtered in.

Among the Democratic casualties were defeats of Representative Champ Clark of Missouri, former speaker and present Democratic leader in the house; election of a Republican congressman from Texas; re-election of a Republican senator from Missouri and a sudden jump of Senator Harding into the lead in Oklahoma. Another border state, Tennessee, hung by a narrow margin, but with the Democrats leading.

A Republican senate majority of about ten, as compared with but two at present and a house majority of around 100, as against forty odd were other forecasts of the overwhelming majorities.

With about eight states still in the doubtful list in presidential and senatorial contests the huge majorities assured Senator Harding and Governor Coolidge of at least 346 electoral votes, with Governor Cox certain only of 127 and all from the "solid South" including Kentucky. The Republicans today added Idaho, Maryland, and South Dakota to their string in the face of large majorities and of the remaining states the Republicans were reported leading in Oklahoma, Arizona, Missouri, Montana, Nevada and North Dakota. Democratic margins in New Mexico and Tennessee were reported.

Among Republican senators elected in hard contests were Lenroot of Wisconsin who was opposed vigorously by Senator La Follette; Spencer of Missouri who defeated Breckinridge Long former assistant secretary of state; and Jones of Washington, senate commerce chairman. Senator Phelan, Democrat, California, was defeated by Samuel M. Shortridge, Republican, and Senator Smith, Maryland, a veteran, lost to O. E. Weller, Republican. Senator Nugent, Democrat, Idaho, was defeated by former Governor Gooding.

"Drys" Unrepresented.

The prohibition party will be without formal representation in the next Congress. Representative Randall lone prohibition member having been defeated. The Socialist Party, however, will again have a member, Meyer London, from New York City. He won over Representative Goldfogle, Democrat, who defeated him two years ago. Former Representative Victor Berger, Milwaukee, Socialist, was defeated by Representative Stafford, Republican.

Representative Mondell, of Wyoming, House Republican leader was re-elected, according to late returns tonight and probably will continue his position.

With Republican candidates leading in several states, the Republicans were certain of a gain of four senators, from California, Idaho, Maryland and South Dakota.

Twenty-nine states regarded from the wealth of Republican majorities, as assured for the Republican presidential ticket were: California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah, Vermont, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

In the Cox column were: Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma and Tennessee.

Gratifying Results.

Boston, Nov. 3.—Governor Coolidge, vice-president-elect, tonight said that one of the gratifying results of the election "has been the nation-wide support of the ticket."

Governor Coolidge spent the day at the State House attending to his duties as governor and announced that he would continue actively to direct state affairs until his term expired on Jan. 1. He added that he had made no definite plans for the period between that date and March 4.

A luncheon was tendered the Governor at the City Club this noon and

when he left the State House after attending a meeting of the executive council, he was accorded an ovation by thousands.

Decision on Issues.

Marion, Ohio, Nov. 3.—Warren G. Harding spent his first day as president-elect resting from the tension of the election night and reviewing late returns with particular attention the make-up of the sixty-seventh congress. He expressed keen pleasure as the growing figures confirmed a Republican gain in both the senate and House for he had told his friends that his greatest apprehension over the outcome had been that as president his hands might be tied by lack of a working party majority in the legislative branch. It was to assist in the election of Republican senators that he deserted the "front porch" for his final swing around the circle.

The avalanche of congratulatory messages addressed to the president-elect and Mrs. Harding increased in proportion today. The defeated Democratic candidate, Governor Cox, sent a brief telegram accepting the result and congratulating Mr. Harding.

With the result of the election known gossip about cabinet selections is reviving and enough names to fill a dozen cabinets are mentioned, all purely in a speculative way as yet. Names most often heard are those of Elihu Root, Senator Knox, Senator Lodge, Charles E. Hughes, Herbert Hoover, Major-Gen. Leonard Wood, Governor Lowden of Illinois, former Senator John W. Weeks and Harry M. Dougherty.

New Congress.

New York, Nov. 3.—So far as results are definitely known the complexion of the new congress will be:

Alabama—Ten Democrats elected; no change.

Connecticut—Five Republicans elected; no change.

Delaware—one Republican elected; no change.

Florida—Four Democrats elected; no change.

Georgia—Twelve Democrats elected; no change.

Idaho—Two Republicans elected; no change.

Kentucky—Eight Democrats, three Republicans; one Democrat gain.

Louisiana—Eight Democrats elected; no change.

Maine—Four Republicans (elected in September.)

Maryland—Two Democrats, four Republicans elected; one Republican gain.

Mississippi—Eight Democrats; no change.

Nebraska—Six Republicans elected; no change.
