EVENING GOWNS ARE MORE MODEST .

The New York Telegraph says: Evening dress of American women is veering very decidedly from the nude effects of recent years. This fact began to gain attention on the night of the opera's premiere, and now that society has been appearing in its most opulent garb in the diamond horseshoe for ten days, it is safe to make a defi nite statement to the effect that this year is seeing more modest decolletes than has any year for a long time.

In spite of this fact, the general ef fect of the horseshoe is more gorgeous and luxurious than ever. The vogue for midnight gowns has passed, and the Winter months are making a display of hues and materials that make an Arabian Night's bazaar of the dim gold and maroon opera house.

Reds, greens, bright blues, black and white are the colors that dot the horseshoe most liberally. Many of the gowns weave these shades into a pattern upon stiff gold and silver cloth procades or velvets.

Velvet by the way is the most conspicuous material and is seen in princess gowns of regal cut and length. These gowns differ from the old-time princess in that they exploit the uneven hem and erratic train.
