That 500 feet of cotton rubber-lined hose be contracted for.

That one dozen water-proof coats be procured, also a small number of salvage covers.

I would suggest that the whistle on the Electric Light Station be raised several feet higher, so that the sound will be better heard by the members of the Department who reside in the back part of the city.
