## CHIEF OF POLICE REPORTS ON THE YEAR 1919

(Continued from page three.)

Douglas and Springhill, under the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916. The duties terminated in July 1919, owing to inability of the Chief Inspector and your commission to agree in remuneration to be paid by the Government of the Province to the city for such services. A sub-inspector independent of the Police has been appointed by the Chief Inspector to look after the enforcement of the act in this district. This change has not produced desired results, as shown by the following comparison of the past four years of the number of drunks arrested in the City of Fredericton and vicinity.

The Prohibition Act came into force in the City in Oct. 4th, 1917 and in the County of York on the 10th day of December 1917.

Number of arrests made for drunkenness for the past four years are: 1916, 94; 1917, 108; 1918, 23; 1919, 143. Thus you will note the increase in the number of persons charged with drunkenness after the Inspectorship was taken out of the hands of the Police in July 1919. This fact should not condemn the act, but is rather the actual result to be expected, when the police were restricted from the enforcement of the Act outside the City from which sources most of the drunkenness originated.

### Truancy

As you are aware your Police Department have had the duty of Truant officers to perform, and this has placed a large amount of work to be performed by this department. During the term ending the latter part of June 1919 the school attendance was not what we would wish for, owing largely to the flu epidemic during the fall and winter of 1918-19. In this work we have had the hearty co-operation of the teachers of the various schools, by a system of weekly reports to the Secretary of the School Board from whom I received same on Monday afternoon of each week, thus keeping in constant touch with the situation.

### Alien Enemies

The registration and receiving reports of persons of Alien enemy nationality has given us considerable work and worry during the past year but I am pleased to note that I have only lost track of one person, who was registered here during the past four years, and I believe that he succeeded in crossing into the United States before that country came into the war. This work is about done no wand Aliens will soon be at liberty to travel in Canada without permission of Registrar.

During exhibition week in September, we had three Special Police Constables employed to assist in directing the regular force in maintaining order in the city, which I consider was well and uncomplainingly performed, notwithstanding the extra long hours I was forced to work the men.

### Traffic Bylaws

Our Silent Police signs have proven of great assistance to us in the enforcement of the traffic law, and I would recommend the purchase of three additional signs, one for the corner of York and Charlotte, one for the corner of Brunswick and York, and another for St. John and Queen Street, for with the completion of Charlotte Street, the main part of the traffic will be by way of Queen and Charlotte and with the ever increasing number of motor vehicles passing through our streets these signs will go a long way in preventing accidents.

During the year there were 263 persons arrested in the City and vicinity in addition we had 31 persons in the Police Station for protection, making a total of two hundred and ninety nine. This you will see then has been an increase in the number of arrests made this year as compared with last year.

I regret to note the large number of doors of business places that have been left open at night, which have been secured by the Police. This neglect or carelessness has caused the Police a considerable amount of worry and I trust that our citizens will be
