NUMBER OF INFLUENZA CASES IN N. B.

ST. JOHN, DALHOUSIE AND
KINGS CO. HAVE CASES

Caution Given by Department of Health—Disease Should Not be "Fought Off."

Further reports of cases of epidemic influenza in New Brunswick have been received by the Department of Health. Dr. G. C. Melvin, Chief Health Officer announced this morning that twenty five cases of the disease had been reported in St. John, three in Dalhousie and two in King's County. All reports were made for Tuesday February 3rd making a total of thirty cases in the province.

Precautions Advised

Dr. Melvin today advised certain precautions to be taken by the public in case of attack by epidemic influenza. He urges that persons so attacked go to bed at once and remain there until all discharges from the nose and throat cease and all heightened temperature pass away. After that it is important that the patient remain at home for at least ten days to avoid bronchitis or pneumonia which diseases following influenza often prove fatal.

The Symptoms

Influenza begins in general with a decided chill, accompanied by headache and pains throughout the whole body. Sometimes it is accompanied merely by the symptoms of the ordinary "cold". These symptoms are generally followed by high temperature or fever which in non-complicated cases will continue three, four or five days after which convalescence will occur. The patient should be confined in one room and seen by the physician attendant and if necessary the clergyman, but no one else.

During an epidemic of this disease all places in which people are liable to be crowded in close proximity should be avoided and people should travel as little as possible. Dances, parties and similar entertainments, should be omitted during the time an epidemic occurs or threatens.

Particular Caution

No person should attempt to "fight off" the disease or attempt to continue work when suffering from the disease. This is one of the most dangerous things which can be done.
