

REFORMERS IN LONDON  
FACE THE RAG TERROR

London Student Pranks Turned Into Public Hazings, Like the Pussyfoot Johnson Affair, for Leaders in Unpopular Movements—First Intention was that "Rags" Should be of a Friendly Nature

London, June 1—A new terror threatens leaders of unpopular movements and foreign visitors to Britain with self-created misfortune. The student takes the form of a "rag" which is English for a Princeton pee-rade.

Mr. Asquith has been the latest notable victim, "Pussyfoot" Johnson, the American apostle of prohibition, was an earlier one. The "Pussyfoot rag" was nothing more or less than a public hazing party.

It is claimed that these "rags" have been quite friendly. Perhaps that was the first intention. If it was it was very cleverly hidden. As far as the mere spectator could judge the demonstrations were clearly hostile. They were in any case none too gentle. Nor can it be said that the students preferred the subtler attack of ridicule to the cruder method of "horse play."

Nowadays the students "rags" are fully organized capably led and seem to have a semi-political object. No one takes this matter too seriously but the public undoubtedly prefers to show its feelings about an unpopular leader or an unpopular cause in its own way rather than allow the students to interpret the popular view by an unpopular "rag". As long as the "young bloods" of the university and the medical schools confine their high spirits to intercollegiate rivalry no one minds.

"Rags" have always been a part of college life in England, but at the two ancient universities of Oxford and Cambridge they have never taken a political complexion. Nor have they been concerned with the public. In London the conditions are not the same. The colleges are spread over a large area. Any "rag" by students must take them into the streets. And what happens in the main streets of the capital ceases to be of local import.

Mr. Asquith's new silk hat is the trophy of the Polytechnic "rag" and Mrs. Asquith's white heather bouquet and her husband's buttonhole bouquet hang in the students' hall of St. Thomas's Hospital. The "rag" was described by many newspapers as "The Battle of Cavendish Square" and "The Riot of Regent Street." When Mr. and Mrs. Asquith and Lady Bonham-Carter stepped out of their residence in Cavendish square they were greeted with a tremendous roar from a great throng of students, who captured the first automobile that drove up.

The police attacked but could not dislodge the students. A second automobile, this time Mr. Asquith's was immediately taken by the "raggers" and there was a fierce struggle with the police, who finally won. With students clinging to every part of the vehicle and amid a shower of confetti Mr. and Mrs. Asquith and Lady Bonham-Carter were driven slowly into Regent Street, where there was another stiff fight between the police and the students. Mr. Asquith's hat and buttonhole bouquet were coolly taken and Mrs. Asquith lost her bouquet.

With a policeman with drawn truncheon sitting on the roof and six or eight hatless students clinging to the footboards the automobile crawled slowly through the surging crowds to Whitehall. The automobile, was wrecked. The following day the veteran statesman received a letter from the students asking pardon for "our little rag," declaring that their intentions were of the best and begging the gift

of the hat, rather ruffled but in safe keeping, as a memento. Mr. Asquith responded generously.

"Please accept my best thanks for the letter," he wrote, "and assure the students that I am grateful for their good will and thoroughly enjoyed the exuberance with which it was manifested."

"In other circumstances I might lament the loss of a new hat, but I am more than content to leave what, after their friendly attentions, remains of it in their keeping."

AMBASSADOR  
AT BANQUET

Washington, May 31—Sir Auckland Geddes, the British ambassador, speaking tonight at the ninety-ninth annual commencement of George Washington University, warned the United States against enmeshment in the social "disentanglement of Europe."

Ambassador Geddes asserted that the next fifty or sixty years "are going to be the most glorious or the most disastrous in the history of the world." The present generation "cannot hope to see a successful end to the world revolution now in progress," he said, and turning to the recipients of degrees, added "yours may."




