HIGH SCHOOL TEAM DEFEATED U. N. B. FRESHMEN AT RUGBY— TWO TRIES TO ONE, 6 TO 3

Winning Team Show Steady Improvement, But Losers Finished Strong—Second Victory for the High School—Freshmen Lacked Organization—McCaffrey Scored Both Tries for High School.

The first rugby match of the season was played Friday afternoon at College Field, Fredericton High School winning 6 to 3 from the U. N. B. Freshman team. This is the second victory of the season for the High School the team having defeated St. John High in the interscholastic series at St. John and having been defeated by Rothesay Collegiate at Rothesay in the same series.

Friday's game showed that the High School is improving steadily. It also showed that the Freshmen have the makings of a team although practically unorganized at the present time. Later in the season if the two teams meet again there should be a more interesting contest.

High School Team

It was High School's first appearance here. The team looked good. Picking out of the scrum was an outstanding fault and for it Daggett drew many penalties on his team. The heeling was sharp and the team controlled the ball except in the late stages of the game. This let the halves get away frequently. McCaffrey seemed to have the speed of the team and he was used as often as possible. Both tries were made by him one on following after the ball had been kicked over the line and the other on a run around the end of the line after the ball had been passed out. High School made heavy gains by kicking but failed to convert either try the angle being difficult. Both teams had chances on penalties but failed to realize on them.

Freshmen Will Improve

As usual with Freshman teams there was lack of organization. The team will improve. It had condition however and seemed to play better with an adverse score than without any score. In the late stages of the game High School was kept defending. As might be expected the Freshman play was largely individual. Many of the players did not seem to know what to do with the ball when they got it. There were some notable exceptions to that however. Superior weight in the scrum did not help to any extent. The best feature of the team was its ability to finish strong.

First Half

Right after the kick-off High rushed play into Freshman territory and it stayed there almost the entire period. Penalties on Daggett for picking out of the scrum began at once Referee Burden being strict. McGinn kicked for a big gain. High School came back hard and Freshmen touched down and saved a score, the other team losing a chance through poor play. After the drop-out play went close to the Freshman line but the pressure was relieved by a long dribble. For the balance of the period play remained at mid-field and the whistle sounded with the ball barely in Freshman ground.

Second Half

The second period saw all the scoring. High appeared to be weakening at first the Freshmen taking the play to the twenty-five. Flood relieved with a long punt. The ball went to Mowatt the Freshman full back who found touch on the return for a big loss. This took play to Freshman ground. Penalties on High did not help the

Freshmen much and ragged play by them later let the Yellow and Black get away on a long dribble. Mowatt had a chance to drop on the ball and stop the play but did not do so. McCaffrey fell on the ball over the line and scored the first try. Davidson made a good attempt to convert, as the angle was acute, but failed.

High at this stage had the jump on the Freshmen and kept them defending. A penalty on Freshmen gave a chance for a penalty-goal but the attempt was poor. High School kept within striking distance of the Freshman goal-line. From a scrim the ball was handled promptly to the half-line and it was away. McCaffrey the left-outside man got the ball and out-footed the man opposite him going over in the corner for the second try. Davidson made a poor attempt to convert.

Freshmen came back hard. With the score 6 to 0 against them they worked for a score. From the drop-out they rushed the play and almost at once put the ball inside the High School twenty-five. A penalty against the Freshmen did High little good the kick being poor. Dribbling and punting let High take the ball to mid-field. Freshmen did not let it stay there. Play went up and down the field until the ball went into touch inside the High School twenty-five. Freshmen were using their weight with effect and High School defence could not stand up to the attack. In a series of loose scrums Freshmen kept the ball a few yards from the High School goal-line. Finally a bunch of Freshmen went over and Referee Burden awarded a try the score going to Miller. McGinn failed to convert the attempt being little more than a joke.
