NEW SUITS

Nothing could possibly be more becoming than the long, slim lines of the new suits. All that is most graceful and girlish is brought out by the suggestion of the designer. Suit coats, to the surprise of everyone, are somewhat longer. A few come to the knees and not content with this, hang in a long drooping sweep at the bottom. A long waisted effect is apparent, but more often combining with a slightly fitted waist line, vaguely reminiscent of the Victorian basque. Sleeves for the most part fit snugly all the way down, though occasionally a flaring cuff falls open at the wrist. The suit skirt is tight and straight, an effect particularly becoming to most women.

Except in strictly tailored models the bottom of the suit coat is rarely seen all the way round. A dip at the back is frequently noticed. Often, however, a panel back hangs below the line of the rest of the jacket, and this panel, a particularly distinctive feature of the new garments, may be heavily weighted at the bottom with fur. Collars, having broken away definitely from the restrictions of convention, are doing charming things. The suit collar of the moment is invariably convertible and often faced with fur. It fastens up high about the throat, in chin-chin effect, or falls open in a broad expanse of soft fluffiness. Other collars in cloth are large and various, graceful in line and frequently ornamented with buttons, braiding, bandings or tiny self-tucks.

There is a decided charm about the loose and boxy suits for misses. Some of these are extremely simple, while others carry heavy embellishments of braiding and stitchery. A bolero effect is sometimes introduced, with rippling coat skirt beneath. When the collar is unfastened the front of the jacket rolls open, displaying smart gilet blouse or fluffy lace vestee beneath.

UNCOOKED CHOCOLATE FROSTING

Melt three squares of chocolate in a small saucepan set in a larger saucepan containing boiling water. Add two and one-half teaspoons of melted butter and three tablespoons of boiling water; stir until mixture becomes granular, then add sifted confectioners' sugar until smooth, glossy and of the right consistency to spread. Add one-half teaspoon of vanilla extract and spread at once over top and sides of cake. If the frosting appears too thick, add boiling water drop by drop until it will spread without running off the sides of the cake. This frosting will glaze over the top but remains soft and creamy underneath the glaze.
