TWO NEW MINISTERS

Those who have been harboring the hope that the Foster administration would not be able to carry on must have received quite a set-back yesterday when the announcement of the appointment of two new ministers was made. Hon. Judson E. Hetherington one of the members for the County of Queens, who in the last House discharged the duties of Speaker in a highly satisfactory manner, becomes Provincial Secretary Treasurer in succession to Hon. Robert Murray, while Mr. David W. Mersereau, member for the County of Sunbury, takes the portfolio of Agriculture vacated by the resignation of Hon. J. F. Tweeddale. The new ministers are men in the prime of life and it will be generally conceded that Premier Foster has displayed excellent judgment in inviting them to become members of the administration which has so successfully conducted the affairs of the province, during the past four years. The elevation of Messrs. Hetherington and Mersereau to cabinet rank is not only a warm personal tribute to their worth as representatives of the people, but it is a signal honor for the two fine old river counties which lately gave them and the government, whose cause they espoused, such a hearty endorsement at the polls.

Hon. Mr. Hetherington is undoubtedly one of the ablest and most popular men in provincial public life. Elected to the House in 1917 after a notable victory at the polls, he applied himself to his public duties with great earnestness and diligence and was not long in demonstrating his usefulness as a legislator. The Speakership becoming vacant in the session of 1918 he was unanimously chosen by his fellow members to discharge the duties of that honorable and dignified position and it is needless to say that he more than fulfilled the expectations of his friends and colleagues. A man of native ability, genial and easy of approach and thoroughly independent, he is exceptionally well qualified to administer the provincial finances. His appointment will be hailed with satisfaction by friends of the government in every part of the province, and will be particularly gratifying to the people of Queens.

Hon. Mr. Mersereau, the new Minister of Agriculture, is a man of ripe experience in municipal and provincial affairs, and like his predecessor in office, is a practical farmer, and is thoroughly familiar with agricultural conditions in this province. He was first returned for Sunbury in 1917, and made such an excellent record as a representative of that fine county that the opponents of himself and colleague in the late election forfeited their deposits. In the last House Mr. Mersereau served as chairman of the important committee on agriculture and rendered good service in that capacity. He is a man of great energy, well informed on public affairs, a fluent speaker and is popular with all classes of the people. As the administrative head of one of the most important departments of the government he can be counted upon to carry out the sound and progressive policies which made the department of such great value to the agriculturists during the term of office of Hon. Mr. Tweeddale.

The acceptance of office under the crown by the new ministers will necessitate the holding of bye elections in the counties of Sunbury and Queens and should they encounter opposition it is safe to say that the intelligent electors of those counties will repeat with greater emphasis the splendid verdict which they rendered on October 9th.

Sheriff John B. Hawthorne of this city is being heartily congratulated upon his appointment to the important office of Chief Inspector under the Intoxicating Liquor Act. Sheriff Hawthorne has had a long experience in connection with law enforcement and is generally recognized as one of the most efficient peace officers in the province. As Sheriff of York his duties have brought him into contact with people in every section of the county and he is held in universal esteem. A man of tact and courage, with a wide acquaintance he should have no trouble in making good in his new position.

Says the Toronto Saturday Night: "Canada is hard up. There are no two ways about it, and Sir Harry Drayton, as Finance Minister, might

as well come out into the open with a statement of just how hard up we are, in place of telling it to a lot of brokers and bankers and leaving the public in the dark."

When an individual gets hard up he is compelled to practice economy, but there is no evidence that the government is following this course. At the present time two cabinet ministers and an ex-cabinet minister are enjoying life at the public expense in Europe.

Two former New Brunswickers, Hon. J. H. King of Cranbrook and Hon. W. deB. Farris of Vancouver are members of the Liberal Government of British Columbia which was sustained at the polls yesterday. Hon. Mr. Farris, who won out in Vancouver, is a son of Hon. L.P. Farris of White's Cove, and Hon. Mr. King, who was a successful candidate in Cranbrook, is a son of Senator King of Chipman and a brother of Mr. George E. King, M. P. P. for Queens.

Late returns from the British Columbia provincial elections indicate that the Liberal government will have a working majority. With some polls still to be heard from, the Liberals have 24 members, the Conservatives 15, and the independents 8. Premier Oliver and all of his ministers were returned. The United Farmers do not seem to have elected a single member. In the last House the Liberals had thirty-two seats.

Mrs. Ralph Smith, M. L. A., widow of a former cabinet minister was re-elected at the head of the poll at the B. C. provincial election in Vancouver on Tuesday. She led the next highest candidate by 4000 votes. The attorney general and opposition leader were candidates in the same constituency and both were elected.

The report that St. Pierre, the Edmundston man charged with murder, had made his escape from jail is denied by the sheriff of Madawaska.

 ment. Mr. Marshall said that this cleared Mr. Wilson.

Mr. Robinson Leaves.
 At this point the president put the question for the adoption of the report. With the exception of Mr. Robinson, who did not vote, all were in favor of its adoption. Mr. Robinson then rose, saying:

"I can tell you that there will be a full investigation. I am branded as a liar before the people of the province. I have worked and fought for forty years in this cause, and it is pretty hard to get such a slap in the face and be known as a liar. I have a little manhood left and I promise you that all the facts will come out." In spite of efforts to restrain him he left the room and did not return.

Executive Report.
 The report of the executive signed by Donald Fraser, detailed the steps taken in regard to the referendum on importation of liquor and the defeat of the resolution in the legislature, and added: "Your executive, however, has good reason to believe that in the early part of the next session of the house the resolution will be passed." The report also told of the success of the plebiscite on prohibition in July last and paid a high tribute to the work of the women, the clergymen of all churches, the temperance organizations and Rev. Thomas Marshall who directed the campaign.

Reference was also made to the retention of the services of Rev. W. D. Wilson as general secretary of the Alliance; to the action taken to urge upon the government the appointment of a commission to take over the sale of liquors, and to the fact that names had been submitted to the government of persons who would make desirable commissioners as well as a desirable chief inspector.

Secretary's Salary.
 The financial report was presented by the treasurer, W. G. Clarke of Fredericton. It showed the receipts for the year to be \$6,903.54 and the expenditures to be \$8,508.15, leaving a deficit of \$1,604.1. He said in spite of the deficit all bills that had been presented for payment had been met with the exception of one that was not certified. He moved that the account be passed to the auditor. This was carried.

Mr. Clarke said that membership in the Alliance was not very clear. It was largely made up of representatives of temperance societies and churches and there was nothing definite as to what constituted the membership. He moved that arrangements be made for a definite membership roll, and a small annual fee of \$1 and subscription to a form merely stating that the person signing favored prohibition.

Michael Kelly asked what the salary of the general secretary was and was told it was \$3000 and expenses.

Mr. Goodwin said that he favored the idea of a definite membership list in the Alliance but there were many details to be looked after. Mr. Clarke's motion was carried.

The following committee on resolutions was appointed by the president: Rev. Z. L. Fash, Michael Kelly, Rev. G. M. Young, C. N. Vroom, Mrs. Mary Seymour, E. N. Stockford, Rev. Thomas Marshall.
