MARYSVILLE BATTED A VICTORY IN EXHIBITION GAME WITH Y. M. C. A.

Score was 7 to 3—Boyce Hit Home Run in the Ninth With Bases Full, and Score Tied—Y. M. C. A. Fielding Better But Marysville Batting and Pitching Superior.

Marysville lived up to its reputation as a heavy hitting outfit when they batted their way to victory over the Fredericton Y. M. C. A. team at the Trotting Park Thursday afternoon. The score was 7 to 3. Y. M. C. A. held a safe lead until the ninth inning when the score was tied. With the bases full Boyce sent out one to left field which fell safe and good ordinarily for two bases. It sent three runs home and gave Marysville the game but the grass being long concealed the ball from Outfielder Kierstead of the Y's and before he could find it Boyce had a home run credited to him.

The game was an exhibition contest put on at the request of the Park Association management as an added attraction for the horse races. Voluntary contributions asked from spectators netted sixty dollars. Ed King of the Fredericton City team covered first base for Y. M. C. A. otherwise the team was the same as the league team. Jack Doak of Devon played for Marysville and pitched the full game in good style. The balance of the Marysville team was as in the league games.

Too Much Crabbing.

Cochrane of the Y. M. C. A. was the umpire. His position was a thankless one and there shouldn't have been the crabbing there was from the Marysville team. The double umpire system would have saved much of the trouble.

The Pitching.

"Bunny" Williams was in the box for the first five innings for the Y. team and Hayward Paynter finished. Four hits were made off Williams and five off Paynter. Each hit a man with the ball. Williams passed two men and Paynter one. Paynter struck out six and Williams two. Doak a newcomer in local baseball was hit safely for only five by Y. M. C. A. His fielding was not as good as that of the opposing twirlers who took all chances perfectly while the Marysville man had two errors. In the pitching department Marysville had the advantage.

In the Field.

On fielding the Y team deserved to win and Marysville to lose. Heavy stick work was what won for Marysville who had five errors. Y. M. C. A. looked like winners until the last inning proving the saying that a game is not over until the last man is out. An error, two hits and a sacrifice netted

two runs in the first inning. Marysville failed to score until the third Collett drew a pass, stole second and scored on McPherson's hit. In the sixth Y. M. C. A. increased the lead by one, errors by Doak and Boyce letting Davis score. In the eighth Karl Walker reached second but was thrown out at third. He first was declared safe and then out after Marysville put up a kick. Marysville made one in the eighth on Boyce's single and Anderson's two-base hit. Y. M. C. A. was playing pretty tight and still looked good for a win. In the ninth Marysville upset all calculations. McPherson hit safely. Jarvis made a wild heave which sent McPherson to second. Walker drove out a two bagger and the score was tied. Finn was fielded out at first but Paynter struck Doak with the ball. He then passed Collett filling the bases. Burke struck out making the second putout. It was the crucial point and Boyce responded nobly. He put the ball deep in left field and the long grass did the rest. The hit itself won the game but the batter completed the circuit. Y. M. C. A. had a very long chance to tie or win. They failed, only four batters facing Doak.

Principal Assessor A. A. Sterling has prepared the following statement showing the assessment valuation of the city for the present year and the two years preceding, the assessment for 1920 and the various rates. It is shown that there has been large increase in valuation on both real estate and income and to a less extent on personal estate. The total increase in valuation has been upwards of \$2,600,000.

In spite of the huge increase in valuation which puts the total valuation near the mark of ten million dollars, there has been an increase of ten per cent in the rate of taxation, making it \$2.20.
