## DIFFERENCES OF OPINION ON VOCATIONAL MATTERS

Final Session Held Wednesday Afternoon—Prof. Sinclair Laird of Macdonald College Discussed Question of Learning and Being Taught—Gave Interesting Example—A. C. Gorham and Fletcher Peacock Championed Cause of Technical Education—Dr. W. S. Carter, Dr. C. C. Jones, Dr. H. S. Bridges and Others Defended the Standard System of Education.

The final session of the Educational Institute was held Wednesday afternoon. Despite the inclemency of the weather and the fact that the attendance slips were handed in at the morning session the attendance was large.

Miss McLatchey of the Educational Review was present and spoke in the interest of that publication.

Prof. Sinclair Laird.

Prof. Sinclair Laird, Dean of the School for Teachers, Macdonald College was the next speaker. Prof. Laird spoke on another aspect of Education whether a child goes to school to be taught or to learn. He said that of all the students he had the Jewish women students were the worst of all, in that they take everything and return it word for word. This fault is more general in women than in men, due possibly to the intuition with which they are credited. The idea of many parents and teachers is not understanding but merely learning.

Children go to school either for instruction or education. In the last five years there had been considerable literature regarding the instruction of children. A child is not a vessel into which information can be poured. The best teacher is the one who can train her children to think for themselves.

Sex differences come in also, though they are not worth much attention. All are more or less a mixture of different types. Some have eye imagery, others ear imagery and others touch imagery, etc.

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Nearly every year in the last thirteen in which Prof. Laird has taught he has come across one pupil who has a number form.

Many systems have been made to allow for the promotion of children more by their progress than by grades. Children should be trained to learn the problem, how to ask questions and how to give answers. Not a definition should be remembered but a common sense explanation. If children were only taught to remember examples it would help them to remember the rules much more easily. Children should learn how to supplement ordinary class text books with others.

Children should be trained to diagnose their individual difference, and to distinguish between essentials and non-essentials.

Assignments should be given properly. In rural schools, especially a great deal of the work is assignment seat work and recitation, and if the work for the future for the home could be assigned the child's burden would in the long run be much lightened the child should not only be given a assignment but also direction for study. The consciousness is at a low ebb between 3 and 4 in the afternoon and at height between 10 and 11. With regard to books one of the best ways to study is to read over, rapidly at first, slowly the second time and rapidly the third, so as to get a proper perspective. Children should be encouraged to make summaries of what they do.

Children should be taught of reference books, how to use a card-index system and also with regard to outlines. Children should be trained to make a report on a definite assignment that has been given to them.

Biased opinions of many subjects particularly early church reformation are very often given not only in books but also by some teachers. Preparation for examination is not always gone about in the right way. A reproduction of what the child has been told is not expected but a clear personal idea. It is what the child thinks he is expected to write that he often writes. The details are often learned and the frame work disregarded. It is not the slightest but of use to encourage a child to speak aloud his spelling. His association should be taught his eye and his pen.

In practical subjects it is better to train them to do things by doing and applying them.

A. C. Gorham.

Director A. C. Gorham was the speaker on the subject "Agriculture in the Rural Schools." He asked what is the justification for agriculture appearing in the curriculum of rural schools? and proceeded to discuss his question in a very fluent and convincing manner.

The migration from the rural districts is very startling. The ambitious boy leaves the farm for the city. He attains much there forgetful of the many opportunities back in the home community.

Leadership has been extracted from rural communities. Agriculture has declined and farm life has lost its prestige. Adequate care and education must be given to those who remain upon the farm if we are to sustain a good class of people in the rural sections. The farm is the foundation of national prosperity. In a country such as this with two-thirds of the people farmers or engaged in farming whatever effects the rural life is of national concern. There are many causes of the removal of the people from the farm. One of these is the lack of social activities and pastimes. There is lack of organization. The day of the husking bee and barnraising is passed. There is the unpopular estimation of the farmer the unprecedented rise in wages and shorter hours of work in the towns. All of this makes it harder for the farmer to get help, even at the highest wages.

The art of agriculture will never rise higher than the educational life of the farmer. So far education has helped the boy away from the farm rather than to it. The machine has been running in reverse gear. The school system is now a process of selection, from lower school to High School and from there to college. Of all those who enter schools only 7 per cent graduated from High School, one

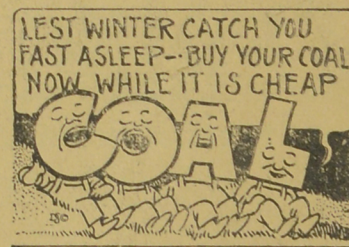
