DAILY FOODS FOR SUMMER

In preparing the menu for summer days it is well to remember that sultry nights and long, langourous hours of food. On the other hand ice cream and iced drinks, which during the actua moment of eating produce a passing sensation of cooliness, are in reality heating because they chill the stomach, and digestion is consequently re tarded. The sudden cold checks the flow of perspiration and waste products, ordinarily expelled through the pores, are retained. So you can never go wrong in serving soup.

While strawberries are still in sea son there is no greater treat than the real old fashioned strawberry shortcake-the kind grandmother used to make-the kind you don't get in the restaurant. For this take two and a half cups of flour, four teaspoonfuls baking powder, half a teaspoonful salt, one tablespoonful sugar, one cup milk three tablespoonfuls butter. Mix the dry ingredients together thoroughly. Work in the shortening with the finger tips and add the milk slowly. Toss on a floured board, divide in two parts F. M. O'NEILL, L.L.
