## NUISANCES

The following, respecting Nuisances, is published for the information and guidance of the public:

### DEFINITION OF A NUISANCE

(Public Health Act, 1918). Section 2, Sub-section (c).

"Nuisance" means and includes any state or thing dangerous or detrimental to human health or comfort through uncleanness, filth, impurities, gases, vapours, smells, dust, smoke, overcrowding, lack of proper ventilation, diseased animals, decay, accumulation or deposit, leakage, overflow, drainage or anything that is, or is likely to be, injurious to health.

The following are some of the Regulations of the Minister of Health respecting Nuisances:

Reg. 130. No owner, proprietor, householder, occupier or tenant, nor any captain or master of any ship, shall commit or maintain or suffer to be committed or maintained, any nuisance in or upon any house, land, ship or other property of which he is either temporarily or permanently in possession or command.

Reg. 131. No person shall commit or maintain any nuisance in or upon any public place, or any street; nor shall any person deposit sputum in or upon any public conveyance, street or the floors, stairs, or parts of any building or ship.

Reg. 135. No stables or other places in which animals are kept, whether in urban or rural communities, shall be so situated that the drainage therefrom shall pollute, or shall be liable to pollute any source of water used for domestic purposes.

Reg. 136. In cities, towns and villages all manure from a stable in which any animal is kept shall be deposited in a manure-bin or other receptacle so constructed that it shall be impervious to flies and rain; such bin or receptacle shall not at any time be completely filled, and shall be emptied not less frequently than each two weeks.

Reg. 138. No owner, occupier, tenant or householder, or captain or master of any ship, shall permit the accumulation of any garbage, swill, animal organic material, decaying vegetables, excrement, refuse or other matter subject to fermentative decay, or rubbish, in or upon any house or premises or ship under his control.

Reg. 142. In cities, towns and villages it shall be the duty of each Sub-district Board concerned to have an inspection made of all conditions relative to each house and family in such city, town or village, as is laid down by schedule, at least once in every year, and as near as may be in the month of June. Nothing in this regulation, however, shall be taken as in any degree abrogating or narrowing either the scope or frequency of inspections at other times as may be thought necessary or expedient by such Sub-district Board.

## TORONTO HAD BEST HOCKEY REVIVAL EVER

Stanley Cup and Allan Cup Matches Furnished Regular Carnival—9,000 Best Attendance.

Toronto, April 5.—The last Stanley Cup game between Seattle and Ottawa rang down the curtain on one of the most successful senior hockey seasons in the history of the Queen City. The amateurs received the lion's share of the support, but St. Patrick's representing professional hockey, enjoyed the greatest patronage ever accorded a N. H. L. team in this city.

When eighty-two hundred fans attended the St. Patrick's-Ottawa game here it was thought that the high water-mark in attendance figures had been reached. It meant a victory for the professionals, for all former records were claimed by amateur teams. The answer from the latter body showed that they were still in the running for when Granites met Tigers in the last of the O. H. A. final games over nine thousand fans saw the Bengals lose the Allan Cup.

During the month of March the greatest hockey carnival in the history of the sport was staged at the Arena and while it was in progress many favorites were dethroned. Granites, Sudbury Sons of Ireland and University of Toronto faltered in the dash for the Allan Cup and out of the mad scramble came Falcons with colors waving proudly and the Canadian championship in their possession.

Toronto fans have seen the finals in the Canadian junior and senior championship races and also got a chance to see in action the best professional teams in the world. The junior title remains in the East, the Allan Cup goes West, while the Stanley Cup remains in Ottawa.

## HEYDLER ON MAGEE CHARGES

New York, April 5.—John A. Heydler, president of the National Baseball League, in a letter to Lee Magee's attorney, today reiterated his denial that Magee had filed any charges against team owners or supplied any names of players whom Magee accused of gambling on games in which they played.

Referring to the claim that Magee was not a member of the Chicago Club in proper standing in 1919 was released without charges being brought against him, he said:

"It is neither customary nor necessary for a club to prefer charges against a player before giving him his release. The matter of the release of Magee is one between him and the Chicago club."

President Heydler promised immediate investigation of charges against players accused of gambling on games in which they participated, but declared he must be furnished with proof or data.

## ROSIN BARRED IN BASEBALL

New York, April 5.—The National League umpires are going to enforce the new pitching rules to the letter. The use of "rosin" will not be permitted. Barmen cannot thrust their fingers into hip pockets where this foreign substance formerly was concealed.

Having been made to understand that the rules must be obeyed, the pitchers with few exceptions now are forgetting freak deliveries, and are getting results. Doctoring the ball is a lost art. It never belonged in the game, and first-class pitchers can get along finely without resorting to such tactics.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Under Sub-Section 2 of Section 73 of the Highway Act 1918 no motor vehicle is allowed on any highway of the Province in the Spring of the year while the frost is coming out of the ground, without permission of the Supervisor, with the exception of physicians, clergymen and ambulance drivers. Sub-section 1 of the same section of the Act forbids the carrying of loads over 3000 pounds and the hauling of portable mills on wheels between the fifteenth day of March and the fifteenth day of May, in any year, without a written permit from the Supervisor of Roads. This notice will remain in force until the Supervisor is satisfied that the road is fit for motor traffic, as applied to sub-section 2, and until arrangement be made with the Supervisor in compliance with the Act, as applied to sub-section 1.

## NOTICE OF LEGISLATION

Public notice is hereby given that application will be made at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, by the City of Fredericton, for the passage of a bill or bills for the following purposes:

(a) To amend the City of Fredericton Assessment Act, 1907, and in particular section 46 thereof, so as to provide that tax notices may be mailed to ratepayers or delivered personally, as the City Treasurer may decide, under the direction of the Finance Committee.

(b) That the said Assessment Act be further amended so as to provide that all females assessed on income or property, real or personal, within the City of Fredericton, and who shall have paid their taxes within the time limited thereby by the said Act, shall be entitled to vote at City elections.

(c) For authority to make a grant for a Memorial in memory of soldiers who lost their lives during the Great War, either by way of assessment or by borrowing, as the City Council may decide.

(d) For authority to grant to the John Palmer Company, Limited, exemption from taxation for a period of twenty years from and including the year 1920; free sewerage for the same period of time under such limitation as the City Council may decide, and water for all purposes at the fixed rate of ten cents per thousand gallons, for the said period of twenty years.

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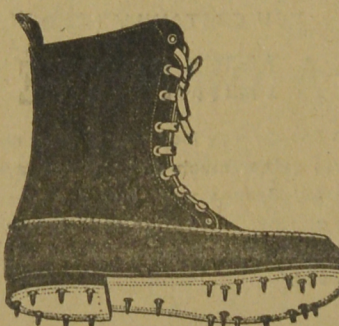
