## THREE HOCKEY MATCHES HERE THIS WEEK

**Interscholastic League Opening  
and Two N. B. H. L. Games  
—U. N. B. Goes Away  
Next Week.**

Three league hockey matches are scheduled for the present week at the Arctic Rink showing that there certainly is a revival of hockey in Fredericton this year. The New Brunswick Interscholastic Hockey League will start things Tuesday night when Fredericton High will play Sussex High. The New Brunswick Hockey League will stage the next fixture Wednesday when Bathurst will play Fredericton. On Thursday night the same league will have another fixture when Bathurst will meet Marysville.

### The School League

In bygone days the High School of the Dairy Town could produce good hockey teams and the present year is not thought to be an exception. Inexperience is against Fredericton High but the Yellow and Black is expected to give a good account of itself against Sussex High.

### Bathurst's First Appearance

Wednesday will be the first occasion on which a hockey team from Bathurst has played in Fredericton, the North Shore town never having sent a team so far south before. With a fine new rink and enthusiastic public support, however, Bathurst will be heard from in the future. On its performance against Chatham at Bathurst the visiting team should drop two games here and fatten the win column of both Fredericton and Marysville in the N. B. H. L. standing. The two local teams are expected to present about the same lineups as they had before.

### Intercollegiate Games

Next week the Intercollegiate League games will begin with the University of New Brunswick filling two dates away from home, Mt. Allison at Sackville and Acadia at Wolfville. Nothing is known of the prospects of either of those teams except that Acadia is rated strong and Mount not quite so good.

## NEW YORK DRUGGISTS WILL NOT DESPENSE LIQUOR

New York, Jan. 24.—That ninety per cent of the druggists of the city have declared against the sale of whiskey for medicinal purposes was the declaration yesterday of Dr. Royal S. Copeland, Health Commissioner. Dr. Copeland made the announcement after a conference with J. Henry Zagat, president of the Bronx Pharmaceutical Association, who declared that at a meeting of his organization a week ago reports were received from similar organizations in other parts of the city, and that as a result of those reports the association went on record as being "against turning their drug stores into liquor saloons."

"As a result of Mr. Zagat's statement to me," said Dr. Copeland, "I have written to the Treasury Department and informed them that it is the consensus of druggists of this city that if physicians require whiskey for medicinal purposes, they should be permitted to obtain it through government agencies established in this city."

"I was informed that less than ten per cent of the druggists of the city have obtained licenses from the government to sell whiskey under the prohibition statute for medicinal purposes. Those places, however, can only receive a limited amount of whiskey under the law."

"There are many physicians in the city who feel that the use of whiskey in pneumonia cases, particularly, is a necessity, but those druggists of the city who will not handle the liquor have also decided that they will not even inform persons with prescriptions where it can be obtained."

"I feel that the government should establish control of the distribution of whiskey for medicinal purposes through government agencies. If most of the druggists of the city refuse to handle the liquor a serious situation confronts these physicians who believe that whiskey in certain cases is necessary as a stimulant."

Dr. Copeland said Mr. Zagat informed him that somebody is dispensing a concoction which contains a small percentage of diluted grain alcohol and which has the smell of whiskey. He said that while the sale of the stuff is illegal, it would not be difficult for anybody to make up such a preparation, provided they could get the alcohol.

"I think the preparation of the thing should be stopped," declared Dr. Copeland, "as it undoubtedly will lead

## REGISTRATION STILL BOTHERS N. S. PEOPLE

The Acadia Recorder of Halifax says:

"Occasional items appear in the press throughout the Province of some former professionals having received registration cards which restore them to amateurism. Some of the former M. P. H. A. players on the ice this winter and who are playing with or against amateurs are Neil White, with the Halifax Socials; Chester Gregory, with New Glasgow; Lowther and Twaddle, with Amherst; Richardson and Fraser, with Cape Breton teams, and others.

If these men have not got registration cards they should not be allowed to play; if they have cards, amateurism in the Maritime Provinces has become a farce, and some of those participating in games with these players may find obstacles in their way when they attempt to compete in other amateur sport. If such well known players as those mentioned have received cards, the public should know it."

The policy announced on behalf of the A. A. U. of C. was that former professionals would be reinstated as amateurs if they showed a willingness to remain amateur after reinstatement.

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## DEMPSEY MAKES APPEAL TO THE BOXING BOARD

Says He Followed Instructions of Government—Asks for a Personal Examination.

New York, Jan. 25.—Jack Dempsey heavyweight champion of the world, has asked that an official investigation be made of the informal charges that he was a draft dodger during the World War. The request was made in a telegram received by Maj. A. J. Drexel Biddle, president of the Army, Navy, and Civilian Boxing Board.

The board has announced that Dempsey's request will be referred to the arbitration committee of that organization for decision as to whether such inquiry should be undertaken. It is stated informally that the investigation will be made by a special committee, including several prominent officers of the American Legion, if they will consent to serve.

### The Telegram

"Last June you gave me a boxer's license, Number 2, which certified on the face of it that I had a clean and honorable record as a boxer."

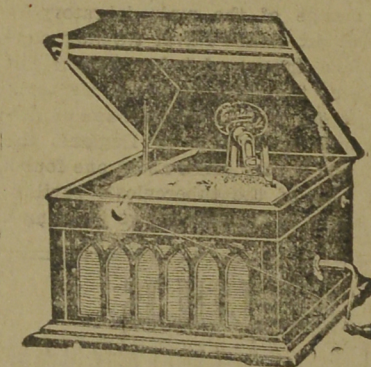
"Since that time a few posts of the American Legion who are not in any way familiar with my record, adopted resolutions condemning me as a draft dodger in the late war, an indictment wholly unsupported by facts."

"What I have done has been to follow implicitly the instructions as given to me by the representatives of the government. The slogan at that time was 'follow the government's instructions.' That applied to me as to every other citizen in the United States and I was carrying out their orders and abiding by their instructions, and I was not a draft dodger as these few legion posts have declared and base their decision on false evidence through persons who are trying to put some over to further their own selfish interests. Am I to be crucified and condemned because I followed the orders as given to me by the government?"

"This is an appeal to you as a body of thorough and honorable sportsmen, whose aim has always been justice and fairness and a square deal for all to investigate this matter thoroughly and if I am innocent of the charge of draft dodger clear me publicly before the world and if I am guilty condemn me."

"I will either present myself personally for examination by your board or submit to you, up telegraphic request a complete statement of my activities during the war in affidavit form, and I agree to abide by your final decision in the matter as to the misjudged without a chance to prove my innocence is cruel and I feel that your honorable board will at least see that justice will be done to me."
