THE TEACHER SHORTAGE

Newspapers in many parts of Canada says Toronto Saturday Night, are emanating originally from the St. Catharines, Ont. branch of the National Council of Women, that an effort be made to recruit the depleted ranks of the school teachers by importing surplus teachers from Great Britain and utilizing trained British teachers now residing in Canada, who have been compelled to turn to other callings. The teacher shortage is common to every part of Canada; but no one wants to see a policy adopted which would enable imported teachers to undersell Canadians, educated partly at the public expense, and already poorly remunerated. If, however, there is in any province a considerable body of British trained teachers, who desire to engage in the calling here, there is no good reason why they should not be licensed on condition that they furnish proofs of having acquired a working knowledge of Canadian history and the Canadian constitution.

We still maintain, however, continues Saturday Night, that the real reason of the teacher shortage is the refusal of many municipalities to pay salaries sufficient to make the profession of teaching offer inducements to capable men and women. So long as men can earn more money as street car conductors with the privilege of striking when the weather is fine; so long as women can earn more money as housemaids, or in a score of other callings, just so long will the number of teachers fall short of public requirements.

It was rather amusing to read in the St. John Standard and other Tory papers a few days ago, a huge advertisement depicting the N. B. Prohibition Act as a breeder of crime and the product of a race that long ago repudiated its international obligations. The act referred to was passed by the Murray-Baxter Government in 1916, and was then hailed by the Tory press as a wonderful piece of legislation. As the Moncton Transcript points out the Standard should never again have the effrontery to ask the people to put Messrs Murray and Baxter back into power.

Candidates are lining up for the Nova Scotia provincial elections and the contest gives promise of being a lively one. The Liberals of Halifax city and county met on Friday evening and to the surprise of many people failed to renominate Hon. George E. Faulkner a member of the government who has been a representative of the County for many years. In Hants County a compromise has been arranged between the parties in order to avoid an election. The two former members a Liberal and a Conservative will be returned unopposed.

the principle that the people can be made rich by taxation, is going to get a punch squarely between eyes.

Mr. J. Ham Burnham, a stalwart Tory who represents West Peterboro in Parliament, has resigned his seat. He says he was elected by both parties in 1917 to support a government formed for the purpose of carrying on the war, and that duty having been performed no course is left for him now but to resign. What a shock it would be to the country if some of the New Brunswick members elected in exactly the same way as Mr. Burnham should follow his example and quit.

The local graft organ is not pleased with the personnel of the Water Power Commission named by the Provincial Government at its recent session. This may be accepted as fairly good evidence that there will be no "hand outs" or "rakeoffs" as was the case a few years ago when the government placed a certain railway enterprise in the hands of a commission.

The retirement of Sir Lomer Gouin from the premiership of Quebec is a distinct loss to the public life of Canada. Sir Lomer has been premier of his native province for fifteen years and has given it wise and progressive government. He is undoubtedly one of Canada's ablest public men and is held in high esteem by men of all shades of politics.

A lot of complaints are being made these days about the condition of the city sidewalks. It is certainly not creditable to the city authorities that they should be allowed to get into such a dilapidated, run down condition. Some effort should be put forth to make them passable until such time as concrete walks can be laid.

Should Hon. Arthur Meighen the new premier of Canada fail to so manipulate things so as to secure the support of the 36 Liberal Unionist members his government will be left without a majority in Parliament. On one division during the recent session the governments majority was reduced to ten.

The reorganization of the Federal Government will probably mean some by-elections. There should be some satisfaction in this as it will give the people an opportunity to show what a poor opinion they have of the politicians who have been misruling at Ottawa for the past three years.

Hon. Arthur Meighen, the new premier of Canada is not unknown in New Brunswick. He took a hand in the Carleton Place by-election last fall, and partly as a result of his efforts the Farmer Candidate Mr. T. W. Caldwell was able to roll up a majority of over 4000.

Advices from Manitoba state that the Norris Government will continue to administer the affairs of the province. There does not appear to be any likelihood of the various groups combining in opposition to the Government.
