THOUSAND DOLLAR FREE-FOR-ALL FOR MIDSUMMER HARNESS MEET HERE LATE IN PRESENT MONTH

Presque Isle Meet Which Would Have Conflicted Has Been

Cancelled—Great Array of Horses Expected to be Entered

—Eleven of the Best Free-for-All Pacers in the Country

in Prospect—Nominations for the September Meet.

Indications now point to Fredericton having large fields for the races in September and also at the midsummer meet late this month. Negotiations with Aroostook County horsemen carried on for some days have resulted in the cancellation of the Presque Isle dates which threatened conflict with Fredericton's dates July 27, 28 and 29. J. W. Gallagher and Secretary Dewitt of Woodstock used their good offices and Dr. G. C. McCoy of this city was sent to Houlton in the same connection. A meeting was held yesterday at which the matter was settled favorably to the Fredericton track.

Part of Circuit.

The arrangement now is that horses which will start at Woodstock next week will go to Caribou the week following coming to Fredericton the week afterward. From this city they will go to Presque Isle which has reduced its fortnight meeting to one week. There is a rumor that the St. Stephen races which were thought to be declared off will be held after all. The others are Oro Fino, 2:03 1/4, White

Thousand Dollar Purse.

The Midsummer Meet will consist of ten races on three days. A Free-for-All Pace has been arranged for the first day, a change being made in the program. For this a purse of one thousand dollars is hung up. John A. Hal, Fern Hal and Peter Farren are assured entries now. Eleven are expected in all. The others are Oro Fino 2:03 1/4, White Sox, 2:03 1/4, Our Colonel, 2:03 1/4, The Problem, 2:14 1/4, May Bird, 2:07 1/2, Zom-Q, 2:09 1/4, Baby Doll, 2:10 1/4. The race should be the greatest ever seen on a local track.

The total amount of the purses is \$4,600. Special conditions have been stated for the Free-for-All Pace. Six are required to enter and five to start. Five percent entrance fee is required in this. In the others it is three percent. The 15th inst is the date for the closing of entries.

Six intermittent classes are included in the program and sufficient entries have been received for them already.

To Advertise at Woodstock.

Representatives of the local track will go to Woodstock next week and will advertise the Fredericton Midsummer Meet. Seventy-four horses are entered at Woodstock and it is expected that all will start at Fredericton. These will include the Potvin and other stables.

The Fall Meet.

The Association has the assurance that the horses which will start here in July will be here again in the fall. The dates of the September meet are 21st, 22nd, 23rd and 24th.

London, July 9—William Barry, described as a fireman on the steamer New York charged under the Defence of the Realm Act with carrying letters from Sinn Feiners in the United States to members of the organization in Ireland. It was stated that one of the letters was from Prof. Eamonn de Valera, "President of the Irish Republic," to Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein organization.

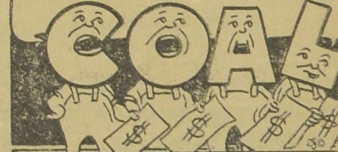
