THE WAR PUT SOME OLD FAVORITES OF THE STAGE

Sea Serpents, Snakes and Fish Used to Occupy a Lot of Space in the Newspapers—The Big Snake of St. Michaels Re-appears in Maryland—Fish Have Poor Press Agents.

A correspondent asks "What has become of the sea serpent, the snake, the fish and the other old favorites that used to have space in the newspapers?" The war shoved these dependable actors off the stage; but only temporary, for one day's reading of the reports of the entertainment they have been furnishing the country shows that they are back. But the world in the meantime has grown more exacting and it now demands from them new acts and a brand new programme.

A sea serpent which does no more than raise "a grisly head above the waves" and show "a long, sinuous body" to the hotel men of the Atlantic coast is not worth a notice. Its act is antiquated. The inland sea serpent that chose the Sandusky River for its appearance had a proper appreciation of publicity and won it from the Ohio newspapers. This "monster" has an "orange head with green eyes" which it elevates several inches above the water, and a body that seems "a combination of immense snake and eel". It attacks fishermen with "frightful ferocity", and though men with shotguns line the river banks they were according to the Cleveland Plain Dealer "too slow on the trigger" to kill the creature. This sea serpent of the Sandusky did more than appear; it chose a new scene and it put snap in its performance.

Hoop snakes may still roll over the Tennessee hills and they may bury the spikes of their "venomous tails" in tall oaks withering them like a stroke of lightning, but they get no credit. Their act is off the stage. Neither can a snake have a place on the bill on account of length and number of rattles.

Easton, Maryland, recently reported that "the big snake of St. Michaels," which has been seen off and on for the last thirty years is out again in fighting mood. This reptile which is "as big around as a saucer" and from fifteen to twenty feet long was hunted by an organized "snake posse" but when last encountered "was tearing through the woods its head raised four feet from the ground and making as much noise as a horse". The fact that about the time that this big snake reappeared a negro who had been condemned to death and who escaped from the Easton jail said when he was recaptured that he would rather take his chances with the police than flee to the woods where "that yer big reptile was" is full of suggestion to jailers.

Our knowledge of reptilian life is considerably increased by some of the reports received. From Harrodsburg, Kentucky comes a moving story of the rescue of a big snake by its mate after a valiant fight with a farmer. From Atlanta we have the details of a "terrible struggle between an aged farmer and a giant rattlesnake" in which the "vengeful reptile followed the farmer for miles." This, says the Georgia snake expert, "was an unusual, an almost unknown thing for a rattler to do." Laurel, Delaware, sends the report of a battle between a big black snake and two reptiles of another species. The witness of the fight says that the blacksnake raised its head and about a foot of its body "and shook one of its adversaries much as a dog does a rat, and then threw it aside dead." It went through the same process with its other foe and the battle was over. This collection of incidents is submitted for the serious consideration of the Central Park and Bronx Zoo snake sharps.

There is, as our correspondent suggests, a dearth of fish stories. Either the fish are poor actors or they have poor press agents. A seventy-two pound catfish was caught in a Ken-

tucky stream and the Louisville Courier-Journal merely makes the incident the occasion for an editorial article advocating the stocking of the streams of the State with food fish. A Winsted, Connecticut, correspondent says that a trout leaped from a mountain lake and caught a young bird that was flying over the surface of the water; a Kansan declares that a catfish took a baited hook from the fishing pier of a Kansas lake and thus hooked itself, and a Newton, New Jersey, naturalist says that William Slacker, "the best guide in Sussex county", picked a bushel of perch from a willow tree. The scientific inference to be drawn from these incidents is either that fish are dissatisfied with their natural element or that there is a food shortage in the fish kingdom and they want our help.

This is only one day's programme. At the same time old High Cost of Living has been holding the stage in an all day and night performance, and the greatest show in the world has been preparing for the road at Chicago and San Francisco. Strong opposition! That our correspondent's "old favorites" have survived it would seem to indicate that they have come back to stay.

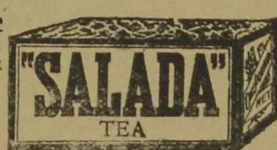
