

MARYSVILLE STILL HAS AN UNBROKEN STRING OF WINS IN YORK COUNTY LEAGUE

Beat Fredericton City Team 9 to 3 Last Evening—Fred McLean, in the Box for the Losers, was Batted Hard—His Support was Not of the Best—Batting of the Marysville Team a Feature of the Game.

Marysville maintained its unbroken record of victories in the York County League by beating Fredericton City 9 to 3 at the Trotting Park diamond last night. The game was a postponed one, and drew a big crowd, as far as crowds go this season. Fred McLean playing under special dispensation of President A. W. Covey of the M. P. B. A. A. U. of Canada was in the box for Fredericton City. Marysville found him early and often, making seven hits in five innings. Poor fielding let one home-run and one three-bagger be chalked up against McLean.

The heavy Marysville batting was a feature of the game. In the second inning Anderson drove in three runs with a home-run. He was the heavy-hitter of the game with a two-base hit, a three-base hit and a home-run to his credit. Marysville in the field had errors but they did not count as did those of Fredericton.

Fred McLean batted well getting a two-base hit and a single. The Fredericton hits were scattered however. McPherson being in good form. Each pitcher had seven strike-outs.

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THE HOME OF THIS RULER IS SHOW PLACE

Great Square of Moroccan City Teems With Natives Who Exhibit Their Wares to Buyers.

London, June 8.—The Morocco correspondence of the Morning Post writes from Marrakesh, the residential city of the Sultan of Morocco:

Djemaa e Fna, "the Trysting Place of the Executed," name of illomen that must not even be whispered in the Sultan's presence, for it is not wise to remind the Lord of Life and Death of the power of his wrath and of that grisly line of human heads which, until the coming of the French, adorned the crumbling wall of the ruined citadel that looks down on the great square of Marrakesh. For those who speak with the Sultan the name of the square is Djemar el R'bah, the square of pleasure and amusement, but for the rest of the world it is Djemaa e Fna.

Probably no other city in the world boasts so vast an open space as the Djemaa el Fna. All day long it is thronged by the floating population of Marrakesh, by the tribesmen of the surrounding district, by men of the Atlas, and even by the nomads of the Sahara from beyond the Atlas, who come to Marrakesh to sell and buy and who when their business is done, gather in their thousands in the square to enjoy themselves in the fashion of the East.

On any given day there are from 20,000 to 30,000 of these migrants in Marrakesh, and their caravans of camels and donkeys fill all its narrow streets. The vision of the crowds in the great square is one of the wonders of the world. Masses of humanity are packed together in the smallest space, but there is no pushing or jostling. Everyone is dignified and unhurried, and with an adroit turn of the shoulders or a short step aside the native makes his way to his goal without disturbance.

In the morning the scene is fascinating enough, when buying and selling are going forward, and piles of white linen, carried shoulder high, make patches like snow in the midst of the gray burruses.

Business Ceases at Sunset.

The culminating moment comes when the sun begins to sink. Then business is at an end and the square becomes the place of amusement. Round story-teller and conjuror deep groups are formed; here a kind of Chleuh dancers, boys dressed like choir boys in fine white surplices, wearing many jewels and with painted faces, dance first slowly, then faster and faster, contorting their bodies until frenzy is reached.

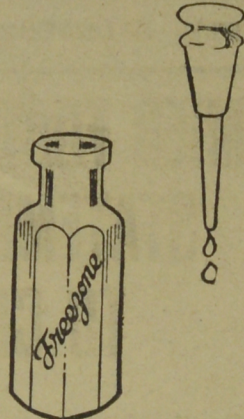
Elsewhere a maniac slashes himself across the head with a battle-ax until his clothes are all spashed with blood. Then he dances on broken glass, and picking up a pointed fragment, screws it into the open wound in his skull with many grimaces. Next door a snake charmer winds some horrible reptile round his neck while the musicians play a savage chant.

Basket ball as played the past winter apparently satisfies the rules committee which met at Hotel Astor, New York, last Saturday. The only important changes made were regarding a player who has left the game other than for disqualification. He may re-enter the game only once. A strict limit for so-called "guarding from the rear" and a new definition of running with ball were made.

George Hoyt of Boston, president of the New England Association of Basketball Officials, was present and described the work of his organization. Letters were read from officers of similar associations in Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. The committee commended the work of these associations and voted to encourage the formation of such in all important basketball centers of the country and Canada.

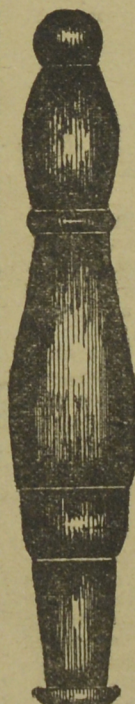

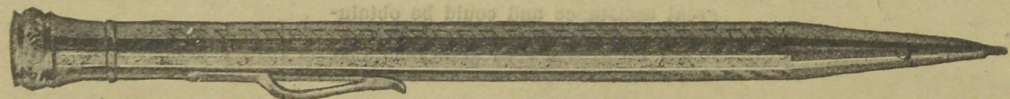
