HINTS TO HOUSEWIVES.

Chopped fat salt pork may be used in pastries.

Eggplants, onions and tomatoes, sliced and put in layers in a casserole and well seasoned, make a delicious main dish.

This morning the convention only transacted routine work and not much of that and adjourned until tomorrow morning.

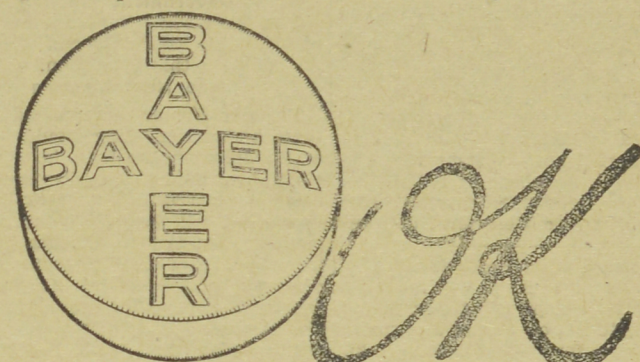
The committee on rules and regulations reported that speeches are to be limited to ten minutes duration.

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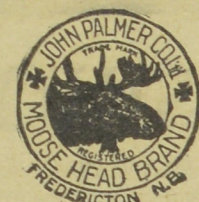


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
