

PRECAUTIONS AGAINST FLU

Dr. Copeland, Commissioner of Public Health for New York City, has issued the following appeal in connection with the outbreak of influenza:

To Nurses—The city is suffering from lack of nurses. Please volunteer for service at \$6 a day or 75c. a hour. Persons with practical experience in nursing will be paid \$4 a day or 50c. an hour.

To physicians—Whenever it may be done safely, please urge your patients not to demand a trained nurse. Leave every trained nurse possible for work among the poor.

To clergymen—Advise your congregations about dangers from coughing or sneezing without covering the face with a handkerchief. Persons who find it impossible to refrain from coughing or sneezing should remain at home. Tell the congregation to avoid fear and to practice the ordinary rules of the simple life.

To the public—Observe the rules of simple living. If feverish or otherwise ill, go to bed and call a physician. The ill should not come in contact with the well.

CRIMINALS

Toronto, Feb. 17.—One again Judge Coatsworth has recommended spankings for youthful criminals. Yesterday Roy Fisher, a bell boy, and Harry Wolfe, appeared charged with stealing a watch from John Chisholm, and on being found guilty were sentenced to one month and five days respectively. The spankings go with the imprisonment.

ity rate per 100,000 of population for the respective peak weeks of 1920 and 1918 shows: Chicago 1.886, compared with 1.620 in 1920; Milwaukee 1.434 as compared with 1915; Washington 2,072 as compared with 9,789.

"These rates may be taken as a fair indication of conditions throughout the country," it was said. "With the exception of some cities in Massachusetts and New York State, exclusive of New York city, practically all of the reports indicate a decline."

TO EXPLORE
THE ANTARCTIC

London, Feb. 12th.—A meeting attended by representatives of the British Ministry of the Air, the Governments of Australia and New Zealand and the Royal Society and other scientific bodies, was held in connection with the British Imperial Antarctic Expedition, which is to leave England on the Terra Nova next June under command of J. L. Cope. The object is to develop the Antarctic regions commercially and an attempt will be made to fly to the pole.

Mr. Cope said he hoped that while in the Antarctic they would keep in touch with civilization by means of powerful wireless. He hopes to ascertain the position and extent of the mineral deposits, obtain further evidence of the localities and migrations of whales of economic value and to create British industries in this trade to investigate the meteorological and magnetic conditions in Australasia and South Africa; to circumnavigate

the Antarctic continent.
The total cost of the expedition is estimated at \$750,000. Captain G. H. Wilkins, chief of the scientific staff of the Stefansson Expedition is accompanying Mr. Cope in this same capacity.
