

## PASSOVER TO BE OBSERVED WITH LIQUOR

### CHIEF INSPECTOR MAKES RECOMMENDATIONS

Temporary Retail Liquor License Granted in St. John for Period of Jewish Festival.

On the recommendation of Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson His Honor the Lieut. Governor has approved of the granting to Israel Corber of St. John a retail license for the sale of liquor during the period of the observance of the Passover and other Jewish ceremonies. These festivals will be observed by those of the Hebrew faith within a short time. The Provincial Government on the recommendation of the Chief Inspector has taken the same view that has been taken in other provinces which have prohibitory legislation in force, that the contention of Jewish people that liquor must be used for proper observance of these festivals, should be agreed to.

### EDITION OF MYER'S HISTORY TO BE REPLACED

Shipping Clerk's Error Greatly Regretted by Firm—Canadian Edition Likely to be Prepared.

The teapot tempest which has been worked up for political purposes by a small clique connected with the Provincial Opposition party over an unauthorized edition of Myers' General History will blow itself out shortly. The publishing firm which sent the offending text-books to its distributing agents in St. John takes full blame for the mistake and greatly regrets that it occurred as it is bound to injure its business in Canada, which is considerable.

G. H. Moore of Boston representing the publishers has been in Fredericton conferring with Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Supt. of Education on this matter. An arrangement whereby the texts of this edition will be replaced by the older edition which served in the schools of New Brunswick since 1910, was made.

### Canadian Edition

Mr. Moore was interviewed by a reporter of The Mail at the Queen Hotel.

"This trouble has arisen over an error made by a shipping clerk of my firm", was Mr. Moore's statement. "I am manager of the Canadian business of the company and I can certainly say that had I known that that edition had been shipped to the distributors in St. John I would have headed off the shipment. The edition was unauthorized in New Brunswick and should not have been sent on that ground alone.

"No reference was made to Canada's part in the Great War in the supplementary chapter of the edition because it was not intended for Canadian schools. Everyone recognizes the part which Canada played and Dr. Myers will prepare a supplement which will cover it.

"As far as the texts now in stock are concerned, they will be replaced with those of the former edition. I hope that I will be able to do the same with regard to individual students but I am not yet in a position to make a definite announcement to that effect."

Mr. Moore's statement evidently forecasts a Canadian edition of the history.

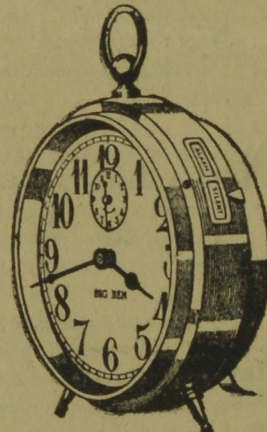
