RECIPES BY MARION HOLMES.

Love Cookies.

One cupful butter, one and one-half cupfuls sugar one cupful chopped raisins, three eggs, three cupfuls flour, one teaspoonful cloves, one teaspoonful cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful nutmeg, one teaspoonful soda. Cream butter and sugar, add raisins, then eggs beaten well, then add the flour sifted with the soda and spices. Roll into a thin sheet, cut in shapes and bake in a slow oven.

Cream Puffs.

One cupful water, one-half cupful butter, one cupful flour. Let the water and the butter come to a boil and stir in the flour dry; cool. When cool so as not to cook the eggs, stir in two well beaten eggs until well mixed. Drop on tins and bake twenty-five minutes in quite hot oven.

Cream for filling—One small pint of milk (bring to boil), one small cupful sugar, one or two eggs, as you like; one-half cupful flour; flavor with either lemon or vanilla.

Lily Cake.

One-third cupful butter, one cupful sugar, one-half cupful milk, one and three-fourths cupfuls flour, two and one-half teaspoonfuls baking powder, whites of three eggs, one-third teaspoonful lemon extract, two-thirds teaspoonful vanilla.

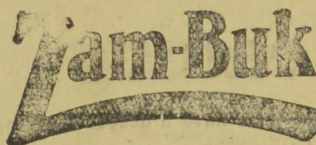

BANK ROBBERS WERE ROUTED

Englewood, N. J., Dec. 22.—A vigilance committee of 500 armed citizens began tonight patrolling the streets in automobiles and afoot during the present crime wave.

Police Commissioner Duryee has been made active head of the new volunteer organization, which will be known as the citizens police reserve.

The automobiles are armed with riot guns and many men are kept on reserve at police stations. All suspicious characters and automobiles were searched after midnight.

New Jersey's crime wave engulfed Milltown yesterday, when four men attempted to rob the First National Bank. A posse of thirty citizens captured two of the alleged robbers after a fight in which scores of shots were fired.

A watchman discovered the quartette and aroused citizens of the town located about four miles from here. Out they turned, armed with revolvers, shotguns, rifles, axes and pitchforks, but the robbers, hearing the approach of the posse, leaped from a window, jumped a fence and fled.

The outraged citizenry followed. Two of the fugitives who later gave their names as Frank Vorhees of New Brunswick, N. J., formerly an enlisted man in the navy, and Clifford Jackson, of New York, surrendered. The other pair escaped.

PLUNKETT IS GLOOMY ON IRELAND

(New York Herald.)

Sir Horace Plunkett, advocate of a plan for the government of Ireland as a British dominion arrived yesterday by the White Star liner Baltic, confident that the British Government's bill for the solution of the Irish question would be ineffective. "The bill," Sir Horace said, "however acceptable it may be in Westminster will never go in Ireland. It represents the supposed interests of that one-fifth of the Irish people which has strong representation in Parliament, but is repugnant to the other four-fifths of the population."

Sir Horace deplored the attitude of the British press on the Irish question, remarking that if it would cease to advocate the policy dictated by the British Government nine-tenths of the British public would be against the bill as it now stands. Until the real news about Ireland was printed in England it would continue to be difficult to solve the Irish problem. American and French papers, being independent in spirit, had printed fairer accounts of the situation in Ireland than the English papers.

"At bottom," Sir Horace said, "the Irish, English and American people are pretty much alike and have much the same ideals and viewpoints on questions of government and public questions. It is because the people in England are not informed about Ireland that the Irish question is difficult. I did not come here to testify before the Villard Committee in Washington."

"I will not make any detailed statement regarding Irish affairs until I have time to get in touch with conditions in this country. My sole ambition at present is to rest, and I shall go west immediately to begin a two months' vacation here. If I do any testifying I should prefer to appear before a more impartial body than the Villard Committee."

TWO WOMEN DIE AT SAME TIME

Digby, N. S. Dec. 23.—The town was startled this morning to hear of the sudden deaths of Olive, widow of C. S. Aymar, and Alma, widow of Capt. Burkett Roney, which took in the same room at the same moment about three o'clock. Both made their home with Mr. and Mrs. Byron Roney, Byron being the only son of Mrs. Roney, and his wife the only daughter of Mrs. Aymar. The latter who had reached the age of 79 years had been ill for several weeks but her condition was not serious.

Shortly after two o'clock this morning she was taken with a serious turn and the younger Mrs. Roney aroused her mother-in-law and summoned the doctor.

On the latter's arrival he saw that Mrs. Aymar was in extremis and the elder Mrs. Roney volunteered to call Stanley Aymar who lived only a short distance away. She did so and returned to the house immediately. A few minutes after Mrs. Roney took off her coat and hat and went to the sick room where she took a seat on the edge of the bed. She was there only a few minutes when she fell to the floor. She lay down. Mrs. Aymar was just breathing her last when a peculiar sound from the lounge caused the doctor to return to Mrs. Roney and found that she too had passed away.
