CHRISTMAS CELEBRATION
WILL BE QUIET

Family Gatherings Will be Numerous—All Day Curling, President vs. Vice-president.

The celebration of Christmas Day in Fredericton will be quiet. The customary services will be held in the churches and the usual family gatherings will take place. This year there has been a greater number of Fredericton people returning to spend the festive season than ever before.

The theatres of the city will have the usual Christmas Day performances. The Arctic Rink will furnish the other amusement, skaters being admitted to the ice in the evening.

Sporting events will not be numerous. The chief one will be the annual match at the Fredericton Curling Ring, President vs. Vice-President, nine rinks a side playing. This match will be continued on New Year's Day. Horse racing which in former years has been a feature of Christmas day will not take place on any organized scale.

CANCELLED TAX STAMPS WILL NOT BE REDEEMED

Ottawa, Dec. 23—The government will not redeem any canceled luxury tax stamps but only those entirely unused and cancelled. This was announced in a circular being issued today by the department of inland revenue instructing merchants how they may secure refunds.

Merchants are instructed to make out a list showing the total number of uncanceled and unused stamps of each denomination in their possession and add up the same in money value. The list should then be forwarded to the local collector of customs who will in turn forward it to the taxation offices of the dominion government. When these returns are verified checks will be issued to the merchants. Many merchants will lose through this system, as in large stores where there were many departments and only one cancelling machine, as many as several hundred dollars worth of luxury stamps were cancelled as received.

Requests of the automobile and confectionery trades representatives in regard to the luxury tax will be hard by Sir Henry Drayton on Wednesday next, Dec. 29.
