THEIR BAD HABITS.

A well known child specialist says that the cracker habit is one of the most frequent bad habits permitted by mothers in their young children. You read this doctor's words telling just why crackers, that might be harmful eaten one at a time after a meal or as a well timed between meal, are unwholesome when munched continuously. Your children munch crackers in this way, too, you have to admit it, but you feel as if it were too late to change. They are used to crackers, you reflect, and it is too late now to break them of the habit.

And the chances are that you have overemphasized the strength of that habit. Simply withhold the crackers for a day or so and you will probably be able to break the habit withut any really great rebellion.

Lots of children's bad habits are much more easily broken than we think. We really haven't the courage to see. We high strung mothers of the twentieth century perhaps dread more than did out huskier foremothers the prospect of letting a stubborn child cry. And so our children early learn that they can bluff us. They learn that we are sensitive to their screams and wails. They know that we will probably succumb before we know it. North End Rebuilt

In less than three yars th commission which was at first engaged n erecting temporary houses for the victims, has practically rebuilt the north end of Halifax. New streets have been laid out and public squares have been provided. The quarter has been well paved and 1000 homes accommodating 6000 people have been erected. Of these over 600 are fireproof, having been built by the Hydro Stone process. This consists in the construction of cement blocks, and while the blocks are still plastic of the application to them of cut stone shavings brought from quarries in Upper Canada. These fragments of stone were pressed into the concrete blocks under a pressure of 1660000 pounds to the square inch of surface. The result was a stone surfaced granite blocq which will wear almost like granite.
