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


Theatrical life in Vienna has not sut fered much by the war, except by con and musicians, and the impossibility of performing plays with large casts and elaborate mounting, as owing to the immense prices of costumes, scen ery and material, the managers cannot raise the very high sums necessary. Naturally the prices of seats have risen accordingly. For Franz Lehar's melodious and very successful operetta "The Blue Mazur," half a million kronen (nominally \$100,000) was spent. A large number of other operatic and musical comedy shows are running with titles such as: "Queen of the Air", "Little Dutch Women' 'Love's Intoxication", "Love at First Sight", "Love on the Roof", "Miss Tuck", etc. According to the Russian Phone 145-31. pattern attempts have been made to "socialize" a theatre; but with what success remains to be seen.
