UNIVERSITY RUGBY TEAM MADE POOR SHOWING IN EXHIBITION GAME ON THANKSGIVING DAY

City Won 9 to 5—College Team Appeared Stale—Fredericton Showed Surprising Form—Match of Regulation Length Might Have Had Different Result—Kicking the Only Department in Which Red and Black Made a Showing—University Team Weakened by Absentees.

The University of New Brunswick Rugby team made a disappointing showing Thanksgiving Day when it played a team selected from the City. The Fredericton team won 9 to 5, and for a long while it looked as if the U. N. B. would not score at all. The game was an exhibition one and was used for the purpose of trying out college players and getting a line on the team.

The Red and Black team looked stale. Twenty-minute periods were played on account of lack of condition on the part of the City players. Had the game gone the full time it is probable that the college team would have shown better for whatever its faults lack of condition is not one.

Forwards Away Off

The college forwards failed to get the ball except toward the latter part of the game. When they did get it the ball was poorly handled between scrum and half-line. The latter failed to get away at all largely through slow passing and fumbling. The gains were made by punting. Trimble, Cain and Mackenzie all kicked well. In the loose the forwards were better than in the scrum.

City Has Good Material

The game showed that the City still contains material good enough to be licked into shape for a fair town-team. Practice and training would make a big difference. The forwards surprised everyone by their heeling. This was due largely to the work of Patterson and Turner who were in front. Burden, McNair and Carter outplayed the Red and Black quarters. The same was true of the halves except in kicking. In Aston, the City had the best fullback seen here in many years. On one occasion he made a play reminiscent of "Dick" Tibbits, booting the ball back over his head. He always put his men on-side a piece of play that the great majority of backs forget to do. The sole U. N. B. try was made when Aston tried to run the ball out instead of kicking from behind his own goal-line.

College Changed Men

Leo Cain, after being used at quarter the first period, was placed at inside-half where he worked better. Hagerman and Harrison were used a period each on the half-line. Akerley replaced Bridges in the forward line. Capt. Saunders was out of the game with a sore ankle. His presence would have made a great difference in the scrum. Changes in the Red and Black team will follow this game.

First Half

From the start the college team played without "pep." City, on the other hand, seemed to have all that was required. The college was forced to touch down within a few minutes. From the drop-out play went back to U. N. B. territory and Walter Howie scored after some good passing by the City halves. Aston failed to convert. U. N. B. still failed to show any life. City forwards were dribbling well. Deedes dribbled the ball over and the college again had to touch down.

The college began to show signs of vitality and took the ball close to the City goal-line by dribbling. The City team was equal to the occasion and relieved the pressure. College had to defend. Wallace, who played a good game throughout, except for high tackling, went over for the second try after some dodging and passing by the backs. Aston again failed to add two points by converting.

Second Half

In the second half U. N. B. failed to show any change of form. Cain, in the half-line, made an improvement, however. City rushed the play, its

backs doing some very good passing. The ball soon was inside the U. N. B. twenty-five. Cochrane scored the third and last try, going through about half of the college team on a dodging run, and being allowed to circle behind the goal-posts. Aston, who was consistently poor in his attempts to convert, again fozzled.

The college still remained rather punk and play went back and forward on short runs, kicking and some forward work in the loose. Gradually the U. N. B. team began to improve and the City to sag back. Long punting by Cain and Trimble, told for heavy gains and soon the Red and Black was within striking distance of the Fredericton goal-line. There was ragged play at this stage and the ball was kicked to Aston within City's in-goal. Instead of clearing by kicking he tried to run the ball out. He was tackled and failed to get the leather back of the dead-line. Cass fell on it for a try. Mackenzie took a good chance for goal and put the ball over the bar for two more points. A few minutes later time was called.

TONS OF SUGAR TO BE STORED AT AMHERST

Amherst, N. S., Oct. 17—Indignation at the Board of Commerce's effort to place artificial and unfair restrictions on the sale of sugar is perhaps greater locally than elsewhere, for within the past few hours it has become public information, that awaiting rising markets, there is stored in one of the large buildings of this town an immense quantity of sugar, which by actual weight amounts to three million, two hundred thousand pounds. Although this amount is a goodly quantity all right enough to supply the ten thousand population of this town with more than three hundred pounds each it is only part of that which is consigned to this one place of storage.

From a reliable source it has been stated that the full quota exceeds what is now here by some five million pounds, over eight million pounds being the total amount expected. This amount of sugar represents at the price of twenty cents a pound the sum of one million six hundred thousand dollars. Some parties even state that the total amount assigned here will exceed in value two millions of dollars.

The amount of sugar that goes to make up eight millions of pounds can be realized to an extent if one will picture a solid road made of bags containing one hundred pounds each and extending from Halifax to Windsor, a distance of about forty five miles. That this amount of sugar that will be here when the eight million pounds shipment is all to hand.

SMALLPOX IN ONTARIO

Brockville, Ont., Oct. 18—Because of an outbreak of smallpox in Morrisburg, Dr. Paul J. Maloney, of Ottawa, provincial officer of health, has ordered all public amusement places and pool rooms in the village closed for an indefinite period. Six cases have so far been reported.
