DUTCH ENGINEER PLANS AERIAL FREIGHT TRAIN

Fokker Would Have Carriers Without an Engine, Towed by an Airplane and Carrying Freight—Tells His Plans to a European Aeronaut—Exposes Blunders of the Berlin War Office—Artillery Would Have Been Superseded.

New York, March 12.—Fokker, the Dutch aeronautical engineer whose fighting planes assisted the Germans to withstand for so long the Allied onslaughts in the air, is making plans for the development of the aerial freight train. It is his purpose to design an airplane that will tow other airplanes carrying freight. The freight-carrying airplanes will not be equipped with engines.

The aerial freight train will fly along specified routes and at each large town it is Fokker's idea to release by an automatic "slipping" arrangement one of the freight airplanes. In this manner a direct service will be maintained with all large cities without the

necessity of the train stopping at any other than the final destination.

These ideas of Fokker are contained in correspondence received by Laurence L. Driggs, president of the American Flying Club, from a European aeronaut who recently had a long conversation with the famous Hollander. This conversation shows that Fokker's idea grows out of a scheme proposed by the German War Office and which is now revealed for the first time. It is interesting in view of its possibilities in future war as well as the possibility of completely eliminating the artillery arm of all military forces.

The German plans, as disclosed by Fokker are:

"But for the blunders of the Berlin War Office the Germans would have developed airplane warfare to such an extent that they would have put the artillery out of commission; they would have made the big guns as old-fashioned as spears."

The Dutch inventor is now working out a scheme for engineless planes to be used in "air coasting." Sporting contests with such planes would be very much like coasting contests on the winter runs in the Alps. An air coaster would be towed by an airplane to a height of 5,000 feet or more and then cut loose. The flier could

make a record by staying in the air longer than his rival; he might try to make more spirals downward, or he might try for speed in coming down. "They are just as safe as airplanes, and I think the day will come when air coasting without engines will be a

\$45,000,000 THEFTS FROM CARS SHOWN.

Booty Double That in Any Pre-War Year.

Wholesale looting of merchandise in transit on the railroads of the United States caused a loss of approximately \$45,000,000 in 1919, according to United States Railroad Administration statistics made public recently.

This is estimated to be more than double the losses sustained in any pre-war year, but it is pointed out that the increased cost of the commodities stolen, roughly estimated to average 85 per cent, must be taken into consideration when comparing the losses in the days of low prices with losses now. Nevertheless there has been a steadily increasing number of packages stolen, and the organization combatting the thieves have met an increased ingenuity in diverting goods from their owners.

A technique of robbery has been developed so highly that the methods of "master thieves" are similar in the United States, England, France, Italy and Argentina, according to a recent report of the United States Chamber of Commerce in Argentina. Detectives, however, are inclined to discredit that organization's belief that a "widespread international organization" is at work stealing merchandise.

Substitution is the usual method used by the thieves. Sometimes boxes supposed to contain velvets are found at their destination to be filled with calico or other cheaper grades of cloth, but as a rule, waste paper is found. These are referred to as "concealed losses" by railway men, and are especially difficult to trace, as the shipment leaves and arrives apparently in good condition, and it is almost impossible to discover at what point the theft occurred.

The silk industry has been one of the most severely hit in the last year, and so great has the risk become that the Railroad Administration has been considering excluding raw silks from the privilege of freight transportation by rail. The Merchants' Association of New York, through its traffic bureau, has protested against such an exclusion, advocating some less radical measure to minimize or prevent the theft of silk in transit.

Guelph, Ont., March 13.—At the Perth Shorthorn Show and sale Mr. J. J. Elliott of this place purchased the grand champion of the show, Millhills Comet, for 6,600 guineas, or approximately \$33,000. This ten-month-old calf was bred by Mrs. Stewart of Millhills. He belongs to the Clipper tribe and his sire was Cupbearer of Collyne. The Aberdeen Free Press states that he is one of the best Clippers ever shown at Perth.

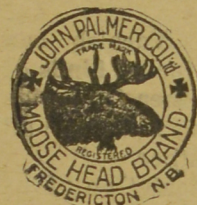

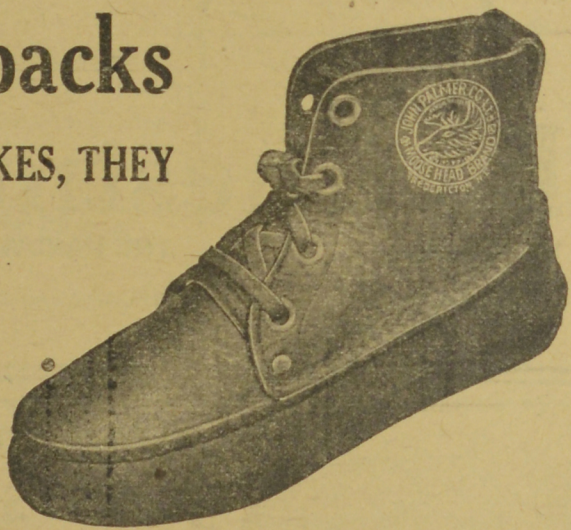
