

## GIBSON BRANCH OF C.P.R. AGAIN HIT BY STORM

### TRAINS MAKING SLOW PROGRESS BOTH WAYS

Otis Train Not Out to Junction,  
and Woodstock Train Be-  
low Cardigan—Sat-  
urday's Storm.

Just as weather conditions were indicating a thaw and a general return to spring-like conditions, a heavy storm of hail and snow set in Saturday followed by lower temperature which made the weather as wintry as ever and left about as much snow as before.

There was a difference of thirty-eight degrees in the temperature between Saturday and Sunday morning and a slippery crust which formed Sunday made walking difficult. A gale of about thirty miles an hour made things unpleasant for pedestrians Saturday night. About three inches of hail fell followed by a slight rain. About an inch of snow followed early Sunday.

#### Hard on Railways

The storm made trouble for the railways which have been fighting the snow and ice all winter. Today all trains are delayed but the majority are getting through. The Gibson Branch of the C. P. R. is an exception. The train which left for Woodstock this morning at two o'clock this afternoon was about a mile this side of Cardigan and the train which left Otis for Fredericton had not reached Southampton Junction.

On the St. John & Quebec Railway on which service was restored by the C. N. R. last week, trains are running behind time today with trouble at various points.

## FARMERS' AND DAIRYMEN'S ASSOCIATION WILL OPEN HERE ON TUESDAY IN THE NORMAL SCHOOL

Main Influx of Delegates Expected Today—Public Session With  
Address by President C. F. Alward and Welcome by Mayor  
Reid, Tuesday Night—Principal Speakers are Men Who  
Have Personal Knowledge of Conditions in Province.

The forty-fourth annual meeting of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association of New Brunswick will open in the Assembly Hall of the Provincial Normal School at nine o'clock Tuesday morning. The advance guard of delegates to this gathering already are here but the main body is expected tonight with some belated ones tomorrow.

Contrary to practise the first session of the association will be in the morning and will be devoted to business. Formerly the opening session, Monday evening, was devoted to the president's address and the address of welcome by the Mayor of Fredericton. These features will be Tuesday night. His Worship Mayor Reid welcoming the visitors.

#### Large Attendance

In the past upwards of two hundred delegates have attended each annual meeting and it is expected that there will be no decrease in the number attending.

The chief speakers of the convention will be members of the agricultural department of the Province and Dominion who are actually engaged in work in this province and know local conditions. In the past it was the custom to bring a number of experts from Ottawa to speak. This week there will be a few outside speakers.

The session will continue until Thursday at noon when the delegates will go to the Dominion Experimental Station in this city. If necessary there will be an extra session Thursday night to dispose of what business may be unfinished.
