

APPRECIATION OF WOODSTOCK'S NATURAL FAIR GROUNDS AND TRACK

American Writer Describes the Location, Also Horses Training

There for the Maritime & Maine Shortship Circuit—Co-operation and Absence of Knocking a Great Feature.

An American writer boosts Woodstock's track thuswise:

It would be hard for any turf scribe to paint a word picture that would do justice to the beautiful exhibition grounds and racing plant at Woodstock, N. B., located on an island in the St. John river and within a stone's throw of the business centre of the city. The island contains 100 acres as level as a billiard table, and not a stone on the whole surface as large as a marble is to be found. Along the water's edge on tall sides is a growth of shrubbery which gives an artistic finish to the whole. There is a fine grandstand, seating over 2,000 people, a beautiful exhibition building, electric lighted stables that accommodate about 100 horses and plenty of other buildings to house the exhibition stock.

Horse interests are very much on the boom at the N. B. city. The Woodstock Driving Club wanted a representative horse for the free-for-all racing classes in lower Canada, so Oro Fino, 2.03½, was purchased to carry the Woodstock colors. The stallion has been placed in charge of the capable young New England trainer John J. Hanafin who will train and race the son of Copa de Oro through the Maritime and Maine Short Ship Circuit.

De Witt's Horses

The Northern Maine trainer, J. A. DeWitt is located at Woodstock with a useful looking stable, the members of which are the seven-year-old trotting gelding, Old Glory, 2.22½, by Bingara, dam; The Gaiety Girl, 2.15 Peggy Hal, pacer, bay mare, seven, by Walter Hal, 2.04; Cassie W. pacer, 2.30, bay mare, eight, by Aroostook

Vassar; Northern Lilly, pacer, black mare, four, by The Northern Man, 2.06½; Vera North, pacer, black mare four, also by The Northern Man and Colorado Rose trotter bay mare six by Colorado E., 3, 2.04½. "Lon" DeWitt is a reliable trainer and in Old Glory (an own brother to Millie Irwin 2.09½), he has a trotter that will no doubt race very profitably.

McKinnon Horses

Tom Vincent is at Woodstock with Bettina, 2.13, trotter, by Bingara, and the pacing gelding, Dusty Dan, 2.09, by Galbetor, 2.11½, both owned by Pope D. McKinnon, formerly of Bangor, Maine, but now a resident of Woodstock.

Jennie Gallagher

James Gallagher one of the best known horsemen in the country, "just across the border," is an enthusiastic as ever, and has a stable of five that look to be good enough to give their owner-trainer a lot of pleasure and, incidentally, enlarge his bankroll. The stable consists of three pacers and two trotters: The Money Man, 2.14½, College Swift, green six year old gelding, Sis Peters, a no-record six year old pacing mare, by the Newport Stock Farm (Vermont), Myrtle Rysdyk, 2.22½, Togo M., trotting gelding, six years old.

Other Horses

Most of the members of the Woodstock Driving Club own horses. C. A. Poole has the good looking pacing mare, Merriwise, W. B. Belyea owns Rhona Adair, 2.24½, Walter F. Mott has the fast pacer Hanks Bellini 2.11½, Warren C. Bull has the pacing stallion Orward Wilkes, 2.14½, Dr. H. M. Martell is the owner of Lady K. 2.24½, George Nicholson has a handy going black pacing gelding that is a con-

DAILY SERVICE ON THE VALLEY RAILWAY

Passenger Trains to Run on Week Days on the Same Schedule as at Present—Through Sleeper to Quebec Daily Except Sunday.

With the time changes on Canadian National Lines effective June 27th the Passenger Train on the Valley Railway will run every week day on the same schedule as at present, viz. No. 47 will leave St. John at 12.55 noon (eastern time) and reach Fredericton at 4.30 p. m. leaving for Centreville at 5.00 p. m.

No. 48 will leave Centreville at 6.00 a. m. arriving in Fredericton at 10.00 a. m. and leaving for St. John at 10.30 a. m.

There will be a mixed train service from St. John to Fredericton on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, and from Fredericton to St. John on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. A mixed train will also go to Centreville on Monday, Wednesday and Friday and arrive from Centreville on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

The through sleeping car for Quebec via McGivney and the Trans-continental will run daily except Sunday, the trains between McGivney and Quebec having been put on daily schedule.

OUTLOOK IN THE MARITIMES

Halifax, June 22—A banker in St. John, N. B., is quoted as saying that legitimate business in New Brunswick has no cause of complaint about banking accommodation. "We are not loaning money for speculative purposes," he said, "and I don't think any banks are giving credit to speculators, but the real business man is not being subjected to any restriction of credit that is going to hurt him. At present we have made pretty heavy loans to finance lumber operations, but I don't think anybody is being kept short of legitimate credit.

"Deposits in the savings departments of the chartered banks in New Brunswick are not so large as usual at this time of year" said the manager of one of the banks in St. John, "but this is explained by the fact that people are still applying on their subscriptions to the Victory Loan, and they are more interested in stocks and bonds than they used to be. When they get money now they are more apt to invest it in securities which will yield more to them than the savings bank rate, which, once on a time, was sufficient for them. The banks are not collecting the savings of the East for the benefit of the West, as some people profess to believe. One factor we consider is the staple character of business in the Maritime Provinces, for we are bound to do our best for our clients in the East."

These conditions hold true also of Nova Scotia. In Halifax there is evidence of a slight lessening of business activity in retail lines but this can largely be accounted for by local conditions. At present the strike in the Halifax shipyards, where 1,500 men are idle, is a factor in reducing business activity in this city.
