MAN WHO DAZZLED HALIFAX
SOCIETY MET HIS DOWNFALL

Alleged Australian Ace Who Gathered in Diamonds and Coin
from the Smart Set in the Sister City Likely Soon to Take
Up His Abode in Dorchester—Had a High Old Time in the
Nova Scotia Capital.

Halifax, June 23—Coughdon, Coughdon or Brennan, or whatever his name really is, the man who passed so effectively in Halifax a week or two ago as to get away with some thousands of dollars worth of diamonds without paying for them and in the meantime being lionized in society circles, being dined, danced and theatre-partied to his heart's content, is behind the bars at Montreal. He was arrested there by the police Friday, and Detective Penney left a Saturday to bring him back to the scene of his diamond escapades to face the law on charges of stealing \$3000 or \$4000 worth of "sparklers". These gems are the property of Birks and Sons, Ltd., of this city and a Montreal lady, who was on a visit to Halifax and by whom the diamond expert was innocently introduced in society circles as an "Australian Ace", seeming a modest, likeable sort of a chap. Coughdon, who is about 33 years of age, came here about May 22nd and was in the city until June 7th. He put up at the Birchdale and is said to have been in uniform when he arrived, a feature the military authorities have been looking into. In some manner the word was passed in society circles that he was a real hero, an Australian ace with a great war record, who had been gassed and wounded and was travelling for the benefit of his health. So he was taken up with open arms and even managed to get the entree to Government House. He showed an inclination toward religious fervor and on one occasion accompanied one of the prominent Halifax society ladies to service in church.

High Finance

With the announcement that he had banked his money in Montreal he was able to exchange a cheque on a Mon-

treau bank with a lady for her cheque on a Halifax bank in order to finance himself here for the time being. When his cheque was presented at Montreal however, there were no funds. But by the time that word reached Halifax the big play in the diamonds game had been made and Coughdon was off on his way west. The matter was kept quiet for a day or two before being reported to the police and the resultant arrest at Montreal yesterday is a tribute to the efficiency of the Halifax police, who had traced Coughdon to Montreal and had an intimation where he might be landed. This information Chief Hanrahan communicated to the Montreal Police authorities and hence the arrest of the "Ace" in a Windsor Street apartment building there on Friday and the recovery of \$7000 or \$8000 worth of diamonds, some of which may have been obtained in other places than Halifax.

A Pair of Boots, Too

The diamond stealings are the only reports made to the police here, though during the visit of the "Ace" to the city an overcoat and a dress suit are reported to have disappeared from rooms in a hotel, and also a pair of boots belonging to a member of the Lieutenant-Governor's family.

During his stay in Halifax the "Ace" visited the Birks establishment with a Montreal lady, while she was doing some shopping. The lady is of high standing and when the "Captain" was seen with her he was regarded as of equally good standing. So when he returned to the shop later and after looking over some diamonds asked that he be entrusted with some to take to his hotel for a selection, though it was irregular, he was permitted to do so. That was the last the firm saw of those diamonds.

The same day while the Montreal lady was absent from her apartments he made an excuse to get the maid out of the apartments to the lawn for a time. When the lady returned later she was horrified to find her diamonds and jewelry gone. And it turned out a little later the "Ace" was gone, too, though it can be said to his credit that he did not fail to pay his hotel bill.

A Night in Amherst

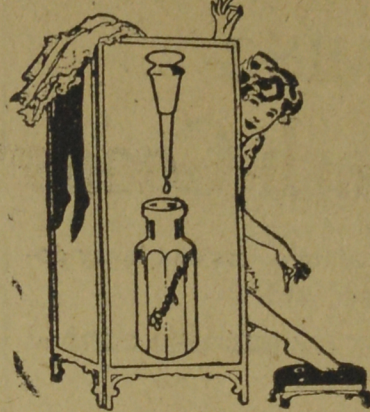
When the two diamond robberies were reported to the police a couple of days later they got busy, opened up the wires and kept them hot, and soon had the ground throughout Canada and the Eastern States covered with a net work of messages giving a description of the "Ace", and telling how badly he was wanted. They traced the "Ace" from the time of leaving Halifax for Kentville in auto through to Amherst, and then to Montreal. Chief Detective Kennedy went to Amherst and found a man answering the Ace's description had registered at a hotel there as "G. J. Brennan", and had shown a couple of diamonds to people there. The detective also learned that an Amherst young lady on the Maritime Express train on May 22nd bound for Halifax on a short visit had been introduced to the "Ace". She accidentally met the "Ace" while here and he said he would call on her at her home at Amherst a few days later on his way to Moncton. On June 7th she received a telegram signed "Mickey", stating he—the young lady did not know who—was on the train from Halifax and asking that she meet him. Thinking it was some friend, and there had been some mistake of the signature in telegraphing, she was at the depot and found to her surprise the "Ace" was Mickey. He accompanied the young lady and some friends to a theatre that night, and he stayed in town over night, registering as "G. J. Brennan". He was apparently off next morning. The detective found "Brennan" had secured transportation for Vancouver and got the numbers of his ticket and berth registrations. It was at this time that Chief Hanrahan learned the "Ace" might stop off at Montreal and wired the Montreal police where he might possibly locate giving a good description of him.

From remarks reported to have been dropped here by the "Ace" he seemed somewhat familiar with Moncton, though apparently not well versed on Canadian geography generally, and the local police are wondering if he could have been mixed up with a cheque robbery which took place at the railway hub some weeks ago.

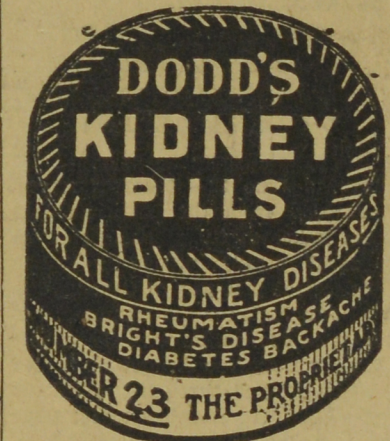
