## SESSION OF PARLIAMENT MAY LAST UNTIL JULY

Contentious Matters Likely to Engage Attention of the House for the Next Few Weeks—Budget May be Delayed Until After Sir Robert Borden's Return—Members May Ask for Increased Indemnity.

Ottawa, April 27—Rumors blossomed out everywhere in the corridors of parliament today to the effect that from now on the session will be most contentious, that as a result parliament will not come to an end before July, and that the budget which had been expected to come down next Tuesday or Wednesday, will receive a further delay of a fortnight. It is reported that the dissension among the opponents and advocates of the various new taxes proposed for the raising of revenue will necessitate another caucus and perhaps may lead to the budget being delayed until the return of Sir Robert Borden.

Your correspondent however was informed by one near to the government tonight that these tales were merely tales, that the government still hopes to bring down the budget next week, and that it sees no reason why the session should not end quite early. This may be the right view, but if it proves that there is very little fire to the rumors there certainly is a lot of smoke. One member even said that the government counts on the hot weather as an ally to weary opposition to its measures and bring things finally to a close. One thing is sure that if the session lengthens beyond the expected time the demand for an increased indemnity which has so far been made in whispers will increase to a roar. After four months of Ottawa twenty-five hundred dollars indemnity does not look large to the hard-working members, and a large number feel that they would only be doing the fair thing by themselves and others who will follow if they were to raise it another fifteen hundred dollars.

The premiers return is also the subject of a great deal of desultory talk. Those Unionist members, and their numbers are becoming legion, who do not expect to come back to the house after the next election are ready for any workable compromise in the selection of a leader if Sir Robert Borden announces that his health is not sufficiently restored to stand the gaff. Many want him to stay whether he can "rule the roost" or not, just to avoid conflict over a successor. Before another election comes they agree that there must be something done, but they do not want to break

away if breaking away entails an early election.

### A Tax on Luxuries

Sir Henry Dryton is believed to be more and more in favor of an excise tax on luxuries and a possible raising as well of the tariff on the same items. Those westerners who advocate an excise tax of five per cent on all articles which are protected, are still insistent that this tax, inasmuch as it reduces protection to a certain extent and provides revenue would command their support and that only with such a tax would they consent to the war duties remaining.

Retail men have been conferring with Sir Henry, asking that a tax shall not be levied on turnover, and they say that if such a tax is put on, they are assured of modifications on the one per cent suggestion. It seems not impossible now that the business profits tax will remain as well as the income and some of the excise tax. If the business profits tax is taken off, the insistence is strong then an excise tax shall take its place.

The charge is being made more or less openly that certain industries have been favored in the application of the business profits tax, and that they have been allowed to use profits for extension of plant and various changes in contemplation of certain mergers whose formation were casting their shadows before. No collusion is charged but simply that the methods of collection allowed this to be done before the tax was collected on the balance shown as profits.

## ATTRACTIONS AT THE MOVIES

The week-end bill at the Opera House is "Raffles" with John Barrymore as star. Mr. Barrymore is one of the best of the American actors. There is also a good comedy. At the Gaiety is the play "Behind the Door" with Hobart Bosworth as star.

The picture is splendidly directed, and tells in a dramatic manner the story of a strong man's revenge.

Mr. Hobart gives a vigorous and dominating performance as Oscar Krug, an American of Germans parentage, who settles the question of his loyalty by successfully putting up a single-handed fight against the narrow-minded citizens of his town, and then enlisting in the American naval service. He is put in command of the Perth.

His bride, Alice, hides on board when her father disinherits her on learning of her secret marriage. The Perth is torpedoed and Krug and Alice drift for days in a lifeboat. A German submarine pretending to rescue them, takes Alice and leave Krug to drown. He is saved by another vessel and returns to the service determined to "get" the commander of the German U-Boat.

Krug's ship attacks the submarine later, he tricks the commander into telling how Alice came to her death, and then takes revenge by employing his knowledge as a dermatologist to literally "skin the villain alive." The tremendous climax is not actually pictured, but so effectively told that it is almost gruesomely real.
