THE WOMEN MEN LIKE

There are many noble, sensible fundamentally charming women who feel themselves thoroughly adapted to be faithful, devoted wives and useful, loving mothers and who are justly annoyed and puzzled when they see the sort of women that the men seem to prefer. Says an exchange, it looks almost as if the majority of men liked the shallow, the cheap, the frivolous, the vain, who may amuse for the moment, but who are certain to fail when it comes to all the tests and trials that real home making and happiness making involve.

Yet the charge is only in part true. Men do like to be amused. When they leave the sober work of life and seek social diversion, they naturally seek those who afford such diversion in largest measure. Furthermore, being human, like women, they enjoy those who enjoy them and show it, even when the exhibition is a little too obvious. Moreover, women rarely understand how difficult it is for men to be at ease with them. When the ordinary unmarried man goes into society he puts on different thoughts, different manners, different habits of moving and speaking and acting. Those habits may be better, as his clothes are; but they are different. He seems thoroughly strange to himself. And he turns naturally to the woman who makes him forget himself, who talks freely and frankly and easily, even if the talk is frivolous and little worth remembering. She may not be the women who men should seek, still less the women whom he should marry, though he often does marry her and regrets it afterwards.

The important thing, however, in this as in so many other connections is that not all men are the same. Frivolous and idle and shallow and self-indulgent men like frivolous and idle and shallow and self-indulgent women and it unfortunately happens that those classes form the most conspicuous elements of general mixed society everywhere—a circumstance that is likely to give the thoughtful a false impression.

members on both sides of the House gave close attention to their duties and the work was carried on without undue friction.

By long odds the most important public bill enacted during the session was that relating to the generation and development of the water powers of the province. Cheaper power is urgently needed if New Brunswick is to have the industrial development which its great wealth of natural resources and its fine geographical position entitle it to and the government is deserving of the greatest credit for grappling with the problem. It is believed that the power commission will be appointed without unnecessary delay and that the actual work of development will begin during the coming season. While it is most desirable that the commission should move with caution there is a general feeling among all classes of people that the boon of cheap light and power should become a reality at the earliest possible moment.

Premier Foster and his colleagues in the government have worked hard during the recent session and their efforts to enact useful legislation have been given loyal support by their followers. It has been an exceedingly busy session from start to finish and the efforts put forth by our law makers are certain to have beneficial results for the province.

Thirty prominent Catholic laymen held a meeting "behind the back" of Archbishop P. J. Hayes Saturday afternoon in the Catholic Church, 120 Central Park South, New York, and decided that instead of the \$500,000 he has asked as the first year's support of his new Catholic Charity Foundation they will raise for him \$1,000,000. One subscription was for \$2,500 annually. Others for \$1,000 followed rapidly. It was decided to limit the range of giving however, so that none of the existing charitable agencies, hospitals, orphanages, etc., be affected by the possible withdrawal of financial support on account of the larger movement.

As was to be expected the bill to increase the indemnity of members of the Legislature from \$500 to \$1000 per session encountered no opposition. No speeches on the bill were forthcoming and it took exactly half a minute to get the bill through the committee stage.

FLOUR ORDERS ARE STILL LIGHT

Montreal, April, 23—There is still no sign of a return of export orders for flour and the mills have been running very light and in some cases have been forced to shut down altogether. Inquiry of a leading manufacturer here showed that up to the end of January the mills, according to an estimate, had produced more flour than during the corresponding period the year before, that is, since the beginning of the new fiscal year of the mills, which opens on Sept. 1 of each year. Since the first of February, however, the mills have been running just about half the normal production.

"The outlook for the mills is rather gloomy at present, but it is liable to change at any time," was the statement made on Thursday. "The countries that used to take from us have been importing a good deal of wheat from the Argentine, but the price there is advancing and the improvement in exchange will help us right along now."

The milling stocks have been quiet this week, showing a tendency to ease off a little in the rather weak market.

Series of Meetings.

A series of meetings is to be begun next week in the interests of the Farmer's Co-operative Dairies. Mr. H. W. Pullman, the Dairy Superintendent for the Province, will have charge of affairs and meetings will be held in different parts of York County, with Fredericton as the centre of activities. This work is under the Provincial Department of Agriculture.

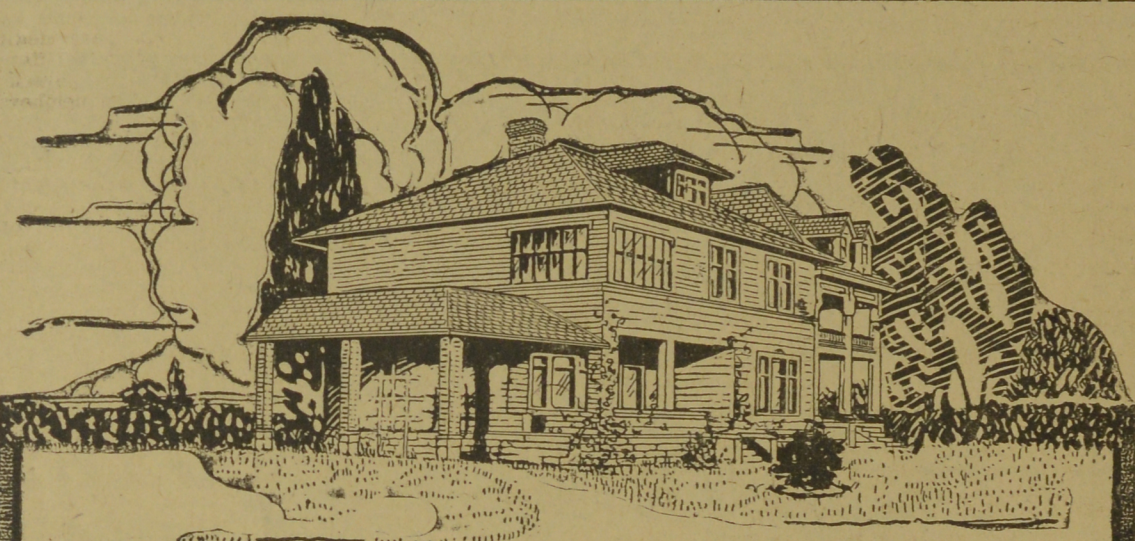

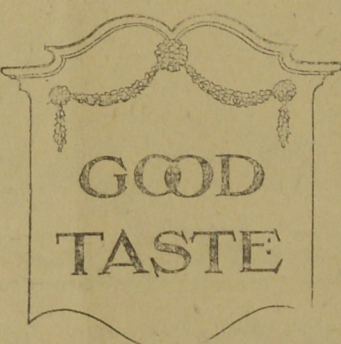
