Department store executives admit that they never imagined there were so many men in New York who would leave their work to look for bargains. They add that they have found out by costly experience that bargain sales addressed to the men of New York have always failed heretofore.

"The recent bargain sales, directed at the men of New York city, have been more than surprising in results," said the merchandise manager of one store which recently slashed prices.

"In former years we spent thousands of dollars attempting to attract men to bargain sales, but we were unsuccessful, for the average man

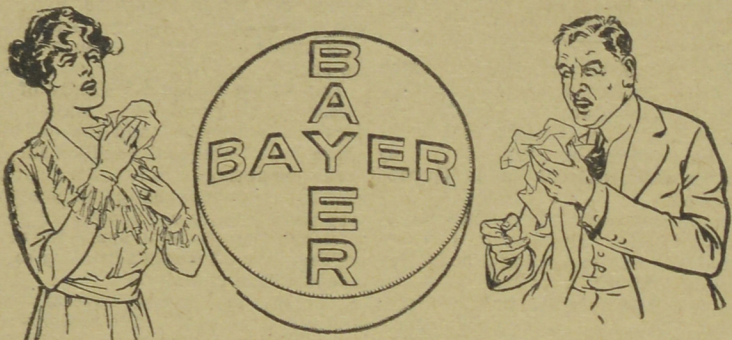
hates the sight of a bargain counter, and if they desired any of the bargains they usually sent their wife, sister or mother to shop for them.

Warton, Ont., June 7—A pitiable aftermath of a war-time marriage in England has, if it is correctly reported, been brought to light here. Early in the war Laurence Keeshig, a member of the Cape Croker Indian band, enlisted, went overseas and was wounded while in active service. While convalescing he became acquainted with a beautiful English maiden, and later, it is said, succeeded in having her go through a form of marriage with him.

Keeshig, who is a well-educated Indian, having graduated from the local high school speaks English fluently, and is possessed of a personality that would make a favorable impression.

Recently the English girl arrived here with a babe several months old. The latter is a beautiful, happy child, and apparently shows no trace of Indian ancestry, being a very blonde type. Keeshig met the couple at the train, and they have remained at a local hotel, not being taken to his home on the Indian reserve for reason, it is alleged, that at that point resides an Indian wife with two or three children, whom he left behind when he went overseas.

The English girl is keeping her own counsel and says little or nothing to any townspeople, and it is deemed probable that she may slip quietly away without causing any trouble to her Indian lover.

HOPES TO STOP COAL EXPORT

Washington, June 8—Senator David I. Walsh's resolution, calling for information concerning exportation of coal and its relation to the New England fuel crisis, was passed by the Senate today.

"It is the first official step directed to obtain evidence which would justify an embargo by the government," said the Massachusetts Senator.

"While the Interstate Commerce Commission is merely requested to investigate the causes of the acute shortage, it is my opinion, after a consultation today with some of its members, that the commission can itself order an embargo on the export of coal, by virtue of the powers residing in that body to take whatever action is necessary to remove any obstacles to the steady and continued flow of trade.

"I feel confident that the investigation will lead to an embargo declared by this commission. Whether the commission can act or fails to act will not ultimately determine the issuance of a coal embargo order, for as soon as the investigation proves that the situation is serious enough to warrant action, the President will be requested to exercise his powers and place restrictive measures on the further exportation of coal.

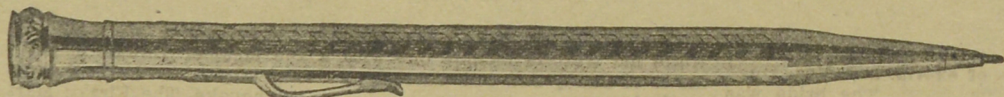
