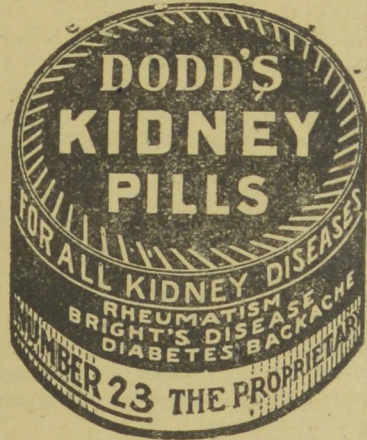

## NEW METHOD OF SELLING DOGS

New York, June 5—Once upon a time pet dogs were acquired in much the same manner as stray cats.

Mitchell, Neb., June 5—One of the strangest cases of animal grief ever known here was brought to light when a shepherd dog belonging to J. F. Paul a farmer living here committed suicide by jumping in the river after having been rebuked by his master.

"That same evening I could not find him. Two or three days later, some children found one of his bones all piled up neatly on the river bank and footprints in the mud where he had jumped in. He had evidently left his favorite bones as sort of a farewell note."

The animal's body was found a mile or so down the stream.
