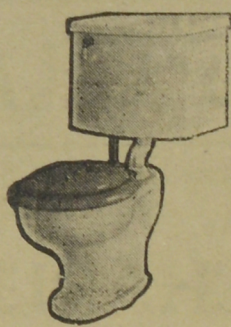

INDEMNITY DISCUSSED FOR THREE WEEKS

Paris, May 7—Light is thrown on the financial side of the Versailles Treaty with Germany by an interview with Georges Clemenceau, former French premier, obtained by Alfred Capus, editor of the Gaulois, and published by that newspaper.

"Several persons know," said the former premier, "that in the Peace Conference discussion of a fixed indemnity lasted for three weeks. We should not forget that a fixed sum for indemnity was the Anglo-American idea from the very beginning, and that our Allies never abandoned this viewpoint. They even made a careful valuation of the sum Germany could pay, which was exactly 75,000,000,000 marks in all.

Out of our share we would have to pay for the reconstruction of devastated regions, and I need not tell you we could not agree to such a solution.

Discussion Ardent

"Discussion was long and ardent, because the Anglo-American idea as to Germany's power of paying was firmly rooted, but finally an agreement was affected, and that solution was embodied in the Treaty of Versailles."

"Isn't that solution one that might be called an 'open account system,'" M. Clemenceau was asked, "by which it is proposed to exact from Germany everything she owes us, but by successive instalments, as we are in a position to fix the indebtedness?"

"Quite right," the former premier replied, "and with the occupation of the Rhineland as a guaranty, both of the amount of the debt and the good faith of the debtor, and with the reparations commission and the permanent control organization. I was in complete agreement with President Poincaré on this plan. When I saw him accept the presidency of the Reparations Commission, I thought his acceptance the logical consequence of our mutual conception."

Approved Resignation

When the interviewer interjected that M. Poincaré had resigned from that position, M. Clemenceau declared: "I approved as he could do nothing else, since our system had been thrown over."

M. Clemenceau spoke at some length on the immense difficulties of peace making, saying:

"They were much greater than the most sincere detractors of the Treaty imagined. I said in the Chamber of Deputies that to preserve union among the Allies I would make every sacrifice. Well, I didn't make every one, I made only some, and those principally in form otherwise an agreement would have been impossible."

MAN WORE GEMS ON GARTERS

Chicago, June 8—A penchant for diamonds on the part of James (Big Jim) Colosimo that rivaled that of the late Diamond Jim Brady was revealed when the police made an examination of his clothing in an effort to solve the mystery surrounding his murder in his restaurant.

On each of the garter clasps they found three diamonds of one carat each. His suspender buckles were adorned with carat stones flanked by two stones of a half-carat each and the elastic straps had been replaced by a closely-woven gold chain.

At the time of his death Colosimo wore a ring set with a single diamond of seven carats. When Colosimo became divorced he gave his wife \$30,000 in diamonds as part of her alimony.

CLOTHIERS MAKE PROTEST AGAINST TAX

Toronto, June 7—Merchant tailors, of Ontario, in general session at No. 2 College street, yesterday voiced their opinion regarding the Budget, and passed on to Finance Minister Drayton suggestions which, in their opinion would remedy the situation. Similar expressions emanated from the retail clothiers' section of the Ontario Retail Merchants' Association on Tuesday. [Both gatherings were largely attended, and thoroughly representative of these trades in the Province.

The merchant tailors urged that, instead of collecting the 10 per cent tax on the full price of suits costing over \$45 and overcoats above \$50 the 10 per cent be levied on the amount the articles cost in excess of these prices. They ask also that the tax be applied only to orders taken after May 19, the date the Budget was delivered.

Further they ask that, instead of collecting the new luxury tax from the retail merchants as proposed in the Budget, this tax be collected by the Government from the manufacturer and the importer.

Regarding this latter phase of the resolution, it was explained by speakers that the trade fully recognized the Government's need of money, and the tailors and retail clothiers did not wish to evade any taxation which is necessary to this end, but, it was argued, from an economical standpoint the Government would receive more money at less expense for collection by adopting this procedure. The retailer would pay his tax when he remitted for his invoices, and would charge the proper proportion to the customer. It was urged that this would be fair and equitable, and the tax could be evaded by no one.

The arrangement proposed in the Budget, the traders declared, would not only be costly and troublesome to the retailers, but gave a strong temptation to dishonesty and perjury, "and besides an army of clerks to handle this tax the government would require an army of spies to see that it is enforced."

KOLEHMAINEN NOT ELIGIBLE

New York, June 9—Hannes Kolehmainen of Brooklyn, triple winner in the last Olympic Games at Stockholm won the 26½-mile Marathon race run Saturday at Travers Island, under the auspices of the New York Athletic Club, in which long-distance runners from principal cities east of Chicago competed.

Ploughing through mud, Kolehmainen did the distance in 2 hours 47 minutes 49 2-5 seconds. Joseph Organ of Pittsburg was second and John Tuomikoski, of the Quincy Mass Athletic Club, was third.

The race was one of the try-outs for the American Olympic team, but Kolehmainen, born in Finland, is ineligible to represent the United States. Organ who was a half mile behind Kolehmainen, covered the distance in 2:51.06 1-5, and probably will be considered by the American Olympic Committee in the selection of runners for the long race.

Kolehmainen used a steady gait and permitted the other runners to keep the lead until in the 25th mile, when he passed Organ, after which he quickened his pace.

Thirty-five of the 55 starters finished.

BOXING SHIELD FOR U.S. FORCES

London, June 9—In the windows of the European office of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Charing Cross, is displayed a handsome mounted silver shield to be presented to the Army and Navy of the United States of America by the Imperial Services Boxing Association.

Emblazoned around the shield is the American Eagle, the Stars and Stripes, an dthe arms of England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales and the Overseas Dominions.

Designed by Harold Stabler, the trophy [which will be despatched to the United States in the course of a few days is inscribed: "To the Army and Navy of the United States of America from the forces of the British Empire, 1919. This trophy is given in admiration of the sporting spirit in which the Americans entered and fought in the boxing tournament, London, December, 1918."
