THE BIG STORM PROVED DISASTROUS TO SHIPPING

Many Steamers on the Atlantic Were in Distress and the Being Towed to Port—The Disabled Army Transport Powhatan is Expected to Arrive at Halifax Today—An Enquiry Made in Congress by Illinois Member.

Boston, Jan. 26—The extent to which storms upset shipping during the last week was further evidenced today in radio messages from distressed steamers scattered over the north Atlantic.

The West Corem announced that she was disabled but expected to reach the Bermuda coast for repairs tomorrow and the West Sula, with her propeller stripped of blades, sent word she was going to the Azores to be refitted. The Oskaloosa put in here reporting in advance from the outer harbor that her steering apparatus was damaged and fuel oil almost gone. The West Sisela wirelessed that she would arrive here tomorrow for repairs.

The Clairton which is towing the disabled steamer Buffalo Bridge, said she was having heavy going with her tow 390 miles off Halifax, and the Airline which has been in tow, disabled, several days reported she was being buffeted by stiff gales.

The Powhatan

Halifax, Jan. 26—A wireless message from Captain Travis of the steamer Lady Laurier to the marine department tonight says that if all goes well the disabled American army transport Powhatan will be in Halifax harbor on Tuesday.

Captain Travis reports that the tow is coming along at the rate of five knots per hour. Since the start was made this morning there has been no serious mishaps. With the exception of the low temperature the weather is favorable and the progress being made is considered as good as can be expected. Captain Travis did not mention in his message if the Laurier was assisting with the tow, nor did he give the position of the ships.

LLOYD GEORGE PREDICTS HIS OWN DEFEAT

Paris, Jan. 27—Mr. fortune has attended statesmen intimately associated with the framing of the Treaty of Versailles in the opinion of Premier David Lloyd George of Great Britain according to a newspaper article published here.

In conversation with a member of the Chamber of Deputies the British Premier is said to have expressed an opinion that the "peace treaty was hard luck for anyone having had a hand in it."

"Yes," the Deputy is quoted as replying, "Premier Orlando is out of office, Premier Clemenceau is again in private life and President Wilson has met with reverses in Washington. Only you have been spared."

"Yes, and in less than six months, it will be my turn," is the reply attributed to the British leader.

Some Questions

Washington, Jan. 26—Secretary Baker was asked to advise congress if the condition of the disabled transport Powhatan was the result of Bolshevism aboard ship, under a resolution introduced today by Representative Britton, Illinois. The resolution would also direct that Secretary Baker supply the house military committee with copies of reports from masters and chief officers of other transports, especially the transport America. Mr. Britton in his resolution says "It is understood that mutiny, theft, gambling and insubordination exist on transports."

Sunk by Submarine

Panama Jan. 26—The American ship ping board steamer Marne aboard which an explosion Saturday afternoon caused a fire ignited the oil bunkers, was sunk today by shells fired into her by submarines stationed at Crotobal.

At the time of the explosion the Marne was on a voyage from New York to Melbourne with an 8000-ton cargo of general merchandise.

WOOLWORTH PAINTINGS BEING SOLD

New York Jan. 26—Paintings from the house furnishings of the late Frank W. Woolworth brought the best price at the sale in Slo's Fifth Avenue Art Galleries yesterday. The session commenced at \$27,336 bringing the total for three days to \$52,000.

Mrs. D. Schoonmaker paid the top price of \$2000 for the painting entitled "The Children's Ball at the Home of His Eminence" by C. Detti and also gave \$1,025 for "The Wedding Feast" by P. Seimas. The second high price of the day was \$1,850 which was paid by John Levy for the picture "The Grand Canal" by Felix Leb. He also gave \$700 for "On the Scheldt" by P. J. Clays.

Olaf Beisheim paid \$650 for the picture "Summer Clouds" by Cardiner A. Rickard. Twenty other pictures were sold at much lower prices.

WAVE OF CRIME IN LONDON

London, Jan. 27—The theft of \$5000 worth of gems from an unlocked suitcase belonging to Lady Loughborough forms a climax to the present London crime wave and provides the Scotland Yard men with a most baffling mystery.

There is no clue as to how and when the jewels disappeared. Last Wednesday Lady Loughborough took them with her from her home to pay a week end visit to friends in another part of the West End and not until Sunday night, when she was packing to return did she discover the loss of the jewels, including a black enamel mascot with "I love you" set in diamonds.

The production of a new musical romance "Medorah" at the Alhambra tonight had to be postponed owing to a theft of the costumes from the dress maker. A great shakeup in police circles has been caused by the commissioner's dramatic dismissal of seven police constables who were discovered in the early hours of the morning after having deserted their beats playing cards in a West End stable.

All the men belonged to the same division where a number of unsolved crimes have been committed recently.

Examination Continued

St. John Telegraph: The preliminary examination in the case of Dr. F. X. Morris, charged with procuring abortion, was continued yesterday afternoon at the infant's home, with His Honor Judge Ritchie presiding. William M. Ryan, appearing for the attorney-general, conducted the examination of a girl witness who is a patient in the home. This witness testified that she accompanied the principal witness to the office of Dr. Morris, on the occasion when the operation was performed. This was the only evidence taken and the accused was remanded for three days. The case will be continued in the police court on Thursday afternoon. Scott E. Morrell appeared for the defendant.

TO END FEUD OF MAJORS & MINORS

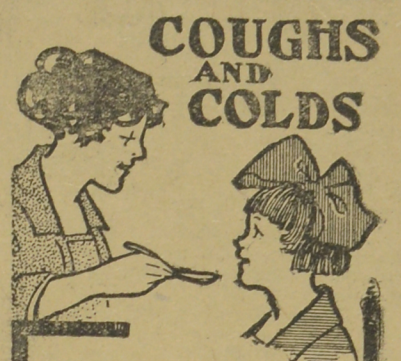
New York, Jan. 26—On his return from the West today, John Heydier, President of the National League announced that the baseball meetings to be held in Chicago next month will be among the most important sessions ever held in the history of the sport.

A meeting of the Joint Rules Committee has been called for February 9. On February 10 the National and American Leagues will hold their respective league meetings and on February 12 the major leagues will confer with the minor leagues committee which hopes to enter into a new working agreement with the majors.

Heydier said he believed a new Commission chairman will be needed at the joint major league conference on February 11. He said the Commission situation now was in the hands of the committee appointed to select a new chairman, and that he believed this committee soon would hold a meeting.
