BRUCE BAIRNSFATHER IN A SWIFT LECTURE TOUR

Famous Cartoonish Says an American "Old Bill" Will be Forthcoming Some Day—Says American and English Audiences are Similar in Many Ways—Has Many Vivid Impressions of American Soldiers in France.

Away back in the busy brain of Bruce Bairnsfather England's pet cartoonist, there is an American "Old Bill" stirring. He is the mingled product of the artist's impressions of American soldiers in France and of the rapid but vivid impressions he is now getting in the course of one of the swiftest lecture tours ever carried out.

While an anxious agent shifted from one foot to the other, alternately consulting a timetable and a watch, Capt. Bairnsfather told about the American "Old Bill" just before a dash from the Ritz-Carlton to a train which was to bear him to an audience of impatient Baltimoreans.

"You see," he said, "when I was in France I received an order to go with the Americans and create some soldier types. It was the biggest order I ever got, because you can't always figure on creating types to order. But I went, and I'm glad I did, because I found right away that the American and English armies have things in common—a whole lot of things. In fact

they have so much in common that the American army ought to have been bunged right up against our army instead of with the French in between.

"Mind you I'm not criticising the French, but they look at war in a different way from the English and Americans. Your men and ours sit around and talk about commonplace things while the biggest things in history may be going on about them and they having a hand in those things. They don't go in for after heroics, such as medal presentations and kissing and all that. It's just a different viewpoint, that's all, and I was immensely pleased when I found that your men and ours looked at things so much alike.

"I wandered all over the American front and made sketches of various types. I found them in plenty, but I didn't make the one type—the 'Old Bill,' because the time wasn't ripe. 'Old Bill' himself was the product of months of boiling and freezing in the mud of the trenches, and any other type will have to take time in the

making. But I have the American 'Old Bill' in my mind and it's coming out some day."

The youthful artist, who is of athletic build, dark eyed and quick of movement—looking in fact as if he might shine either on the football field or in an eight oared shell—did not give a hint as to the American 'Old Bill's' appearance. He did not say whether the type would be short or tall, possessed of the traditional Uncle Sam build and dry humor, or fathered strictly by Bairnsfather but he did speak more than once of the intense pleasure he got in mingling with the American fighters and getting the materials for the Yankee type of fighting man. Furthermore he says he is finding a lot of similarity in English audiences and American—so much that he feels more at home here at the outset than he did on the lecture platform in Scotland.

At present Capt. Bairnsfather is among the busiest of men. He has done one year of a five years contract which calls for turning out four cartoons a week. In addition he is editor of his own journal, called *Fragsments*, which takes a good deal of time in spite of the fragmentary name the editor has given it. In addition there has come the lecture business which is the hardest work of all, especially in Scotland.

A REVIEW OF CURRENT WORLD EVENTS

When the future historian, remarked a prominent financier a few days ago, looks at the events of the past year, he will not see an irrevocable world falling to take steps necessary to recover the road to happiness. He will applaud the efforts of society in Winnipeg, London, Boston and elsewhere, to defend itself against revolution; he will wonder at the activity in the shipyards of the world to supply the lack of transportation; he will see that capital and labor are not further apart but much nearer to reasonable solutions of their difficulties; he will, indeed, from his lengthened perspective, see that the chaos following the war is steadily yielding to that great quality of civilization on which the hope of the world rests—the love of order. We hear much about the decline in the exchange value of the pound sterling and more about Great Britain's loss of ascendancy in the world of finance, but if you will read the report of our London manager you will find no trace of doubt, no murmur of complaint. Great Britain has accomplished the most stupendous things in history; the world owes her more in respect and admiration than it can ever pay; but she asks nothing from others—she is simply clear-sighted and aware of her enormous obligations, and of what they involve. No one who reads this statement will find cause for pitying her. She is so strong and self-reliant; on the contrary, there is abundant cause for pride that we are part of the great empire which in the supreme emergency saved the world.

One feature of the British financial situation which adds to our difficulties is the sale here of Canadian securities hitherto held in Great Britain. So long as the sale in Canadian dollars will produce so much more than usual in pounds, the return of our securities will go on, and each sale has the same effect on our international finance as the importation of merchandise of the same value, commerce (which, under fair conditions might be produced at home and replaced by imports from abroad.
