

SOCIALISTS EJECTED FROM LEGISLATURE

Five Socialist members, representing districts in Manhattan and the Bronx were ousted from the New York Legislature this week. It was done by a vote of the members, only six out of a total of 146 voting against the motion. Pending a decision by the Assembly's judiciary committee, the five Socialists will be deprived of all rights in the Legislature. The reason given for the drastic action of the Legislature was that the Socialist members are opposed to organized government. When the expelled members rose to protest they were immediately silenced by the speaker, and later on they were ejected from their seats by the sergeant-at-arms.

Ottawa, Jan. 9.—Lorne C. Webster, a well known Montreal financier, will be appointed Senator shortly to fill the vacancy left by the death of Senator Landry. 
AMMONIA BEING USED BY ROBBERS
