UNITED FARMERS AGAIN IN SESSION SATURDAY

Sansom & McNally Premises Secured and Business to be Transferred at End of Month.

The United Farmers met at the County Court House Saturday afternoon and made further arrangements for the establishment of a cooperative store in this city. There was further collection of stock and some four thousand dollars worth was subscribed.

A committee was sent to wait upon Sansom & McNally for the purpose of arranging the time of the taking over of that business and the firm's premises for the cooperative store which the farmers' association will establish. It was agreed that the United Farmers would take over the business February 1st.

Considerable business remains to be done in connection with the establishment of the store. The head office at Woodstock must be communicated with and other arrangements made in addition to securing stock-subscriptions.

JOHN HENDERSON NOW OPERATOR IN MINTO FIELD

PURCHASED AREA FROM SMITH & MERRITHEW

Operations Began This Morning—Smith & Merrithew Sold All Except Rolling Stock.

Mr. John Henderson of Minto, late manager for the Minto Coal Company at that place, this morning began mining there as an independent operator. Mr. Henderson purchased the area recently held by Smith & Merrithew Limited. This consists of one hundred acres on a twenty-year lease. Neither Mr. Henderson or the members of the firm which sold, would make any statement with regard to the price but it is understood that it is about the top of prices paid for transfers of that nature in the Minto coal district.

Both Methods Followed

On this area methods of mining are both stripping and shaft. The latter, however, has been more generally followed, although it is possible that the new owner may extend the stripping method.

Houses and Railway Also

Mr. E. Lorne Merrithew of Fredericton stated this morning that the transfer include not only the mining lease and the area, but also twelve houses and all railway trackage laid. The rolling-stock of Smith & Merrithew, however, is not included in the sale and will be removed later by that firm.

New Manager with Minto Coal Co. Mr. Charles J. Coll formerly of St. John, N. S. has succeeded Mr. Henderson as manager at Minto for the Minto Coal Company. He has been at Minto for about a fortnight. Mr. Henderson also had experience in the Nova Scotia coal fields before coming to Minto, having been at Inverness.

Smith & Merrithew, Limited, originally was organized to take contracts on the construction of the St. John & Quebec railway. Later it built bridges and other structures including the buildings of the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton. In recent years it operated mines at Minto. The chief members of the firm are Mr. E. L. Merrithew of Fredericton and Mr. Luther B. Smith of St. John.

MILES PROPERTY TRANSFER TO BE MADE SHORTLY

FORMAL AGREEMENT ENTERED INTO SATURDAY

Some Twenty-five Acres to be Acquired by the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Company.

A formal agreement for the transfer of some twenty-five acres of land owned by Mr. Albert J. Miles of Devon by him to the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company, Limited, was made Saturday, Mr. F. H. Peters acting in a legal capacity for the owner and Mr. J. J. F. Winslow of Gregory & Winslow for the company. A deed of the property has not been made yet but will within a few days.

Near Mouth of Nashwaak

The property sold by Mr. Miles is located in the town of Devon near the mouth of the Nashwaak River and lies between the C. N. R. tracks and the Nashwaak. It extends from the lower line of the Miles property to the Back Creek, so called. This tract is intersected by Barker Street leading to the bridge over the Nashwaak River and the line of the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway. The price is said to be about ten thousand dollars.

Pulpmill Site

The land is being acquired by the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company as a site for a pulp and paper mill to be erected in the future. Power for the operation of the mill will be developed at Marysville where a dam has been under course of erection. It is understood that a power-house will be built at Marysville in the near future. The site of the pulpmill is said to be between the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway and Barker Street which leads to the bridge across the Nashwaak.

It will be some months before plans and survey for the new mill will be completed.

Several premature announcements of the transfer of this property have been made.
