The farmers of this pro vince do not fear competition, and de rive no benefit from the duties now im posed on farm produce. If these were abolished along with the protective duties on agricultural implements, the industry in New Brunswick would undoubtedly be greatly benefited.

The New England States is the na tural market for the surplus lumbe products of New Brunswick, and since the United States government abolish ed the duty on lumber a few years ago the industry has gone ahead with leaps and bounds. In the memorable campaign of 1911 the majority of the lum bermen of the province worked and voted for reciprocity, while many farmers, particularly in York county, opposed it. Since that time, as a result of the abolition of the lumber duties. many farmers who were frightened into voting against reciprocity by the loyalty cry, have disposed of their standing timber at prices greater than they would have gladly accepted for the entire farm ten years ago. The Liberal policy on the tariff, as so clearly set forth by Hon. Mr. King, is sound and will undoubtedly meet with the cordial support of those identified with New Brunswick's principal indus-

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 19-The Illinois search and seizure act has put all own ers of stored liquor in thi sstate "out of luck." Club members and others who planned to move their private stocks to their homes on federal permits were given a jolt when they learned the State law prohibits transportation of liquor in any form on all public highways.

"The government is perfectly willing to let the owners of liquor remove it to their homes," said Major A. V. Dayrymple, Federal Prohibition Commissioner, "but a permit would have no effect on the Illinois law. Furthermore that law applies before January 1 6as well as after that date.' '

Major Dalrymple said that the same provision would forbid an owner to move liquor from one house to another if he changed his residence.
