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

## CITY SERIES TIGHTENS WHEN IMPERIALS BEAT Y. M. C. A. 3 TO 1 IN SEVEN INNINGS OF GOOD BALL

Coyle's Hit in the Seventh Inning Gave Imps the Game—Donovan Scored Y. M. C. A.'s Run by a Four Base Hit—Good Game at College Field Yesterday, Though Called in the Seventh on Account of Darkness.

There is joy in Gas Alley and the gloom which has hung over that well-known thoroughfare, unofficially called Shore Street, has been dispersed. The Imperials sauntered out on College Field last evening and brought home a fair-sized portion of the salt-pork. In other words they trimmed Y. M. C. A. 3 to 1 in the City Championship Series. The supporters of the winning team are beginning again to think that life is worth living.

Seven innings were played and Umpire F. Hazlett called the game on account of darkness with Imperials leading. Many spectators thought play could have continued.

## Imps Finished Strong.

Imperials played exactly according to the form-card. They came from behind late in the game and this time won. Y. M. C. A. weakened in the seventh. Wheeler after three errors and a hit had given two runs forced an other by hitting Johnson with the ball. Jack Bolster relieved him and retired the Imps by striking out Boyne. The sagging of the Y team and Coyle's clout gave the Imperials the game.

## First Home Run.

The first home run of the series was made by Donovan who drove the ball over the Grandstand in right field and out of the grounds. This was in the first inning and was Y. M. C. A.'s only run and for six innings it looked good enough to win the game. During the rest of the struggle Imperials played tight ball. The errors they made were not costly. Y. M. C. A. got men on second and third in the fourth but they stayed there. In the sixth Davis reached third mainly through two errors, but Wright came across with two strike-out.

Wright pitched great ball all through, his eight strike-outs and three assists looking good. The Y's last chance was nipped when Kenney was doubled on Jack Bolster's fly to Lifford.

## The Imperial Side.

The Imps failed to do anything until the second, when Bill Boyce of Marysville drove out a two-bagger one of the nicest hits of the game. He stayed right on second. In the fifth Coyle who redeemed himself by stick-work was fielded out at third. In the sixth it was one, two, three. The lucky seventh dawned bright for the Imps. Y. M. C. A. pulled all their errors of the game in this inning and they were enough to lose it. Bill Bolster made a bad throw which left Boyce safe at second. Donovan had an error which sent him to third and Wandless to second. Hall hit the ball at Bill Bolster who threw Boyce out at the plate. There were two on however and Lifford filled the bases when Davis fell over himself on an easy one. Johnny Coyle hit safely and two runs came in. The Imp rooters went wild as their team took the lead. Wright was fielded out but Wheeler lost control filling the bases when he hit Harrison and

forcing a run when he hit Johnson. Jack Bolster finished the inning and the game was called.

## VACCINATION OF EMPLOYEES

THE FOLLOWING IS PUBLISHED FOR THE INFORMATION OF THE PUBLIC, GENERALLY, AND ESPECIALLY OF THOSE DIRECTLY CONCERNED

"1. Section 30 of The Public Health Act, 1918," being 8 George V. Chapter 36, is hereby amended by adding after the last paragraph thereof the following paragraph:—

No person shall be employed in any camp, ship, factory or other place wherein the employees come at frequent intervals into close and prolonged contact one with another, unless and until such person produces to the employer or the employer's representative a certificate signed by a regularly qualified medical practitioner, of successful vaccination, or a like signed certificate that he is immune to vaccination as proven by three consecutive non-successful vaccinations, or that he is immune to small-pox by reason of having had the disease, and no employer shall employ any person in employment as set forth above, without such certificate being produced. When any person contracts small-pox, who is at the time of the inception of his sickness employed as set out in this section, or who was so employed within fourteen days prior to the inception of his sickness and who has not complied or been required to comply by said employer of employer's representative with the foregoing provisions prior to his employment, then in such case the employer shall be primarily liable to pay all such costs, charges and expenses as the sub-district Board of Health concerned may have incurred in necessarily protecting the public health; provided such charges, costs and expenses were incurred in or about the necessary precautions relative to, or immediately appertaining to, any such case of small-pox, and such costs, charges and expense may be sued for and recovered with costs, in the name of the Chairman of the sub-district Board incurring the same, in any court of competent jurisdiction, within six months of the recovery or death of any such person. Such liability shall be in addition and without prejudice to any liability for any penalty provided for any violation of the provisions of this Act.

The terms and conditions of this section shall not become operative until the first day of July A. D. 1920."
