U. S. ATTORNEY GENERAL BRANDED AS A PLOTTER

Accused by Labor Leaders of Conspiring Against Wage Workers---His Warning Against May Day Violence was Mere Propaganda---No Foundation for the Alarming Things Promised.

Washington May 10—Attorney-Gen. Palmer's warning of threatened May Day violence and announcement of steps taken to prevent it were assailed before the Railroad Labor Board by Timothy Healy president of the Brotherhood of Stationary Firemen and Oilers, as a part of what he characterized as "a despicable propaganda against labor."

Such propaganda Mr. Healy said, was started within less than twenty-four hours after the signing of the armistice and was designed "to poison the minds of the people to such an extent that the profiteers could still further increase prices and place the blame on labor."

While not naming the Attorney-Gen. directly, Mr. Healy told the board that the "crusade" of a "high Government official" against radicals was "undoubtedly for the purpose of aiding in the campaign of certain employers of the country to secure laws establishing involuntarily servitude." He referred to sedition laws proposed in Congress and said that while framed "ostensibly to eradicate Bolshevism," they would have tied labor "hand and foot."

Warning Termed Part of Crusade

The Attorney-General's warning of May Day violence and murder of Federal and State officials was characterized as "the most flagrant instance of this most despicable crusade to influence the people against wage workers."

Mr. Healy declared that May Day had been selected as a day for "imaginary terrible things to happen" because contracts of some unions customarily expired on April 30. He added:

"Representatives of all the newspapers in the United States located in

Washington were called into a conference and told of the great dangers to the American Government. May Day was to be a day of slaughter a red letter day in the annals of government overthrowers. But May Day came and passed. It was as peaceful a day as any other in the year outside of newspaper columns and the minds of certain Government officials. All was contentment."

"This was a vital blow to the instigators of the conspiracy to place a more vicious stigma on organized labor officials who had endeavored to create a fear in the minds of the people that America was filled with disorder than any yet used. Even the editors woke up to the fact that they had been deceived, and now they are putting editorials in saying that the country is laughing at the Government loyal men."

"What did these Government officials do? They had expected May day strikes and under cover of them could more thoroughly work out their propaganda plans against labor."

Had to "Square" Themselves
"They held a hurried conference and decided something should be done to square themselves with the people."

And so word went forth that there were no strikes or no trouble of any kind on May Day, and not even a sign of a murder because of the preparations made to meet the situation. The fact is that nothing was prevented, as nothing was contemplated."

Referring to the high cost of living Mr. Healy declared the public was easily misled.

"At one time they were told to eat fish and the cost of living would be reduced," he said. "They bought so many fish that the prices doubled and trebled. They were told to eat cheap cuts of meat. They did so, and now pay as much for them as they did for tenderloin and porterhouse."

"Government officials who are seeking to discredit labor by concocting conspiracies made it appear that the wage workers are a band of murderers and government destroyers. If the Government officials and Congress had given as much attention to limiting the profits of the profiteers as they did to pounding and hounding the wage earners the cost of living would have been decreased to figures within reason. But they are with the profiteers, and in order to hide that fact they direct all their energy in attacking any one who works for wages."

FIFTY MILLION ESTATE APPEAL

Pawtucket, R. I., May 10—Mrs. Mary D. Sayles has filed in the Probate Court an appeal from the probate of the will of her husband Frank A. Sayles, who died about two months ago and left an estate estimated at \$50,000,000.

By the will she is left the homestead estate and an annuity which may be increased to \$100,000 under certain conditions. Dissatisfaction with the amount left her is said to be the cause for contesting the will.




