

# CANADA TO HAVE MINISTER PLENIPOTENTIARY TO U.S.A.

Announcement Made at Ottawa, Washington and London—  
Unusual Powers—Will be in Charge of All British Relations  
in Absence of British Ambassador—Available Material is  
Not Plentiful at the Present Time.

Ottawa, May 10—Sir George Foster in the house this afternoon read an official statement with regard to the appointment of a Canadian minister at Washington.

The New Office  
Washington, May 10—A Canadian minister to the United States will soon be appointed.

Formal announcement of the purpose of the British government to place her Canadian relations with the United States completely in the hands of Canada, was made today in a statement read in the Canadian parliament at Ottawa by direction of the governor-general and the British parliament at London, and made public here through the British embassy.

Unusual powers are to be conferred upon the Canadian minister. In the absence of the British ambassador he will take full charge of all British diplomatic relations with the United States.

Few Qualified

Ottawa, May 10—Canada's minister plenipotentiary to Washington will not be appointed immediately. In all probability the present session of parliament will be over before the appointment is finally made. The government's view is that "there are very few men in Canada who have all the necessary qualifications for the position. On the other hand the government will soon have to recognize that a large number of former politicians and business men with enough money to retire on believe that they are among the very few men who have the necessary qualifications. The experienced ones, however, canvas only the more obvious names like Sir Robert Borden, Hon. N. W. Rowell, Sir Charles Gordon, C. A. Magrath, Sir Douglas Hazen and Lloyd Harris. The announcement of the duties of the minister plenipotentiary shows that the final plan agrees very closely with the lines laid down by Hon. N. W. Rowell in speaking last year about the appropriation placed in the estimates for the support of such a minister in Washington. It also shows that the new plan is not so radical a departure as might at first sight be thought. During the last few years most questions relating specifically to the United States and Canada have been discussed directly. Now and then the Dominion government would consult the Imperial government to ask it to give general instructions along certain lines to the British ambassador at Washington. That would be done and hereafter in a multitude of cases falling under the general instructions correspondence would occur between the British ambassador and the Canadian government directly. In other words to all intents and purposes in a great variety of matters the British ambassador has been acting as Canadian ambassador taking instructions directly from the Canadian government and reporting the results of his efforts to Canada so long as his general instructions permitted this to be done. The Canadian minister will now do all this work instead of the British ambassador and the present arrangement with the British government will once and for all take the place of the series of general instructions which have had hitherto to be made.

To make the situation regular the appointment of the minister plenipotentiary will make a recognized fact of what had already become in great part established in practice on matters in which both Great Britain and Canada have an interest. The British ambassador and the Canadian minister plenipotentiary will consult each

As to which has the higher status your correspondent is informed that the relative importance and status of diplomatic positions are as follows: Ambassador highest; minister plenipotentiary, second; and charge d'affaires, third.

### Its Warning

"Is this another step towards independence," one of the ministers was asked this afternoon. "If you mean by independence separation from the British commonwealth, no," was the answer. "We take the view that Canada can, along this route, become just as independent as high as a status, deal with her foreign affairs just as potently and look after her affairs just as completely within the British commonwealth as the United States can out of it. There will be no inferiority of status in comparing Canada with Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand or South Africa. With Great Britain there will be a diplomatic unity of the British commonwealth, and in that unity there will be strength, which it would be unwise and foolish of us to discard and lose."
