EDITOR OF SPORTSMEN'S GUIDE HERE

Morris Ackerman, Cleveland, On Fish Trip—Believes His Town Has Pennant Winning Team

In Morris Ackerman who was registered at the Barker House yesterday on his way to Cain's River to fish with W. Harry Allen as guide, Fredericton entertained a sporting writer of wide reputation who has done much to make New Brunswick known as a fish and big game country in Ohio and other Central States. Mr. Allen who is president of the New Brunswick Guides' Association during his tours of that section received much assistance from Mr. Ackerman. The Toronto Globe of Saturday had the following:—

WILDE READY, SHARKEY NOT

New York, May 10—A new bantam-weight star was discovered when "Young Montreal" of Providence won a referee's decision over Jack Sharkey the man who defeated Jimmy Wilde. Montreal put it all over Sharkey in ten of the twelve rounds and won hands down.

Jimmy Wilde occupied a ringside seat and the English midget could hardly believe his eyes when he saw the unknown take the measure of his conqueror so easily. Negotiations now are on for a match between Wilde and Sharkey to be held in London. Wilde has accepted, but Sharkey still is haggling over the terms.

ONTARIO TO HAVE BOXING COMMISSION

Toronto, May 11—Hon. D. Carmichael introduced in the Legislature a few days ago the bill to form an Athletic Commission for the Province. Of this Commission of five members three will be in control of boxing. The other two are for athletics such as encouraging sport in public schools and among the young of the Province.

At present it is thought that a boxing commission given the wide powers necessary for efficiency might clash with the provisions of the criminal code. An effort may be made to get an amendment to the criminal law whereby the powers of the Commission would not be confined to such a degree as they would under the present conditions. The bill it is expected will receive the unanimous support of the House.

HE TOOK UP FLYING JUST TO OBLIGE WOMAN

British Consul at Miami, Fla., Couldn't See Flier Lose Thousand Dollar Wager.

Miami, Fla., May 7—Most of the people in the city are speculating in real estate and tourists. It has taken the enterprise of a woman aviator to make \$1,000 on the obliging temper of Arthur A. H. Hubbard, British vice-consul here.

Besides being obliging the outstanding trait of the vice-consul's character is his aversion to going up in an airplane. That's where the speculation came in. On his latest trip to Nassau Hubbard, as usual, took the little steamship, which makes the 100 mile run from Miami twice a week. At the Nassau Country Club he met a fellow Miamian, an American, who had seaplaned over with the woman aviator.

"We landed with only one gallon of gasoline between us and the Gulf Stream," the American said in his account of the flight. "Great stuff, though. You'd better come back with us."

Mr. Hubbard said he was deeply grateful for the invitation, but had official business that would keep him over until the next steamship. The woman aviator entered and the vice-consul went out.

"Say, I bet you a thousand dollars you couldn't persuade that Englishman to fly back to Miami," declared the American.

Being a sport as well as a sports-woman, the lady took him up and they both wrote out checks for a thousand and put them under the inkstand on the table. Hubbard soon heard the story of the bet from a group of pretty English girls engaged on purpose to "kid" him about it. Three hours later he was taxiing out of Nassau harbor, strapped into the passenger's seat beside the triumphant pilot.

The English girls claim all the credit and say he didn't want to disgrace the British Empire, but the vice-consul, who dislikes airplanes as much as ever, says he couldn't bear to see a lady loose a thousand dollars.

St. Paul, May 10—Mike Gibbons middleweight pugilist, is out of retirement with a challenge to John Wilson of Boston who wrestled the middleweight championship from Mike O'Dowd of St. Paul in a 12-round bout. Gibbons seeks a match with Wilson for July 4 or after in Minneapolis.

N. T. H. RULES RE ONTARIO TRACKS

The season for racing in the Provinces opens May 24 and owners who wish to race on Association tracks during the year will have to be careful as to racing their horses on non-Association tracks. The new rule this year says:

Horses racing upon tracks not in membership with a recognized parent association racing under published rules and keeping records accessible to this association of performers on its tracks shall be eligible only to the free-for-all classes at meetings given by members of the National Trotting Association, subject to review of the Board of Review.
