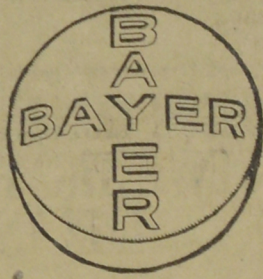


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## MR. PINDER'S HORSE DEAL

Although the story of Mr. J. K. Pinder's horse is an old one it will bear repeating at the present time. It will be remembered that soon after the Hazen Government came into power in 1908 it made an importation of spindle leg horses from Kentucky and disposed of them. One of them was purchased by Mr. J. K. Pinder, then M. P. for York and in exchange he gave a check drawn on a bank where he had no funds and a note for \$800. Mr. Pinder got the horse but the government was unable to realize on either the note or the check. Just before the old government went out of office in 1917, an order-in-council was put through relieving Mr. Pinder of all liability in the matter on the ground that the horse was worthless and that he was "acting in conjunction with the Department for the purpose of improving the stock of the province."

When the new government came into power an enquiry was made in the Legislature in regard to the transaction and elicited the following reply from Hon. Mr. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture.

Q—What action was taken by the former government with regard to a claim of the province on a promissory note of Jas. K. Pinder held by the Department of Agriculture.

A—Mr. Pinder was relieved of his liability for a note of \$800 (given on account of purchase price of a horse) by an order in council bearing date of March 27th of this year.

Q—What reasons were assigned for any such action taken?

A—The reasons given as set out in the recommendation to Council by Hon. J. A. Murray are first, that the stallion that Mr. Pinder purchased from the government proved inferior and not suited for the purpose for which it was required; second, that in view of the fact that Mr. Pinder was acting in conjunction with the Department for the purpose of improving the stock of the province, the government should relieve him of his obligation entered into for the general welfare and not for private gain.

Q—Was there an order in council passed touching the matter, and what was its import?

A—Yes, Mr. Pinder purchased a horse from the government in 1909 for \$1100, gave his check for \$300 and a note for \$800 (according to a memo found in the Department of agriculture), endorsed by Mr. Graham and Moses H. Young of Maple Ridge, and Robinson Bartlett and A. H. Chapman of Temperance Vale; the order in council relieved Mr. Pinder of the liability of the note, but the check was never paid and both the note and check were given to Mr. Pinder from the Department of Agriculture and the province received nothing for the horse.

A Lame Explanation

After the enquiry had been answered Mr. Pinder rose in his place and made the following explanation:

"I purchased an entire horse from the government also a mare that was bid in by another party which was left on the hands of the government. I paid for the mare but the horse was not suited for the purpose he was purchased for and an arrangement was made with Mr. Maherry to exchange it for another one and I sent a man up to Ontario who took the horse up and brought the other horse back and I paid the expenses both ways. I afterwards agreed with the government to pay \$500 in settlement."

"On December 1st, 1913, the C. P. R. took the railway over that I was building, and in my agreement with the government I had to pay the interest on the bonds until the road was taken over by the C. P. R.; that was five month's interest—\$2,583.34. I went to Mr. G. N. Babbitt, Deputy Receiver General at that time, with the money, the amount due on the 1st of January, 1914, was \$3,100. Mr. Babbitt said he had not the \$516.66 to pay, but if I

would furnish it, he would get it paid back to me when the government met. A short time afterwards I spoke to the Provincial Secretary about the \$516.66 and he said that I owed the Department \$500 and he would pay it to that department, and I presume he did so.

It will be noted that Mr. Pinder's statement fails to correspond with the recommendation Hon. Mr. Murray made to the government on the strength of which he was relieved of his liability to the province. Is it any wonder that the farmers of York, who have to pay for their horses, have no sympathy with Mr. Pinder's candidature in this election?

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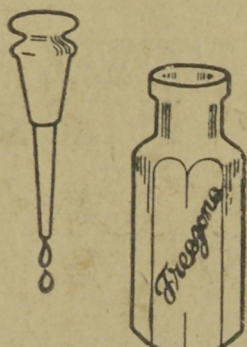
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
