

SEAPLANE HAD TO ALIGHT WHEN DARKNESS CAME

COL. LECKIE WAITING
FOR CLEAR WEATHER

En Route From Montreal to
Halifax—Big Plane on a
Transcontinental Flight
Not to Stop Here.

Col. Leckie of the Canadian Air Board and Major Hobbs are waiting at the farm of Willard Clark in Kingsclear, some sixteen miles west of Fredericton, for the weather to clear in order that they may continue their flight by seaplane from Montreal to Halifax. Their machine is in the St. John River at that point, having been forced by darkness to alight last night. The flight was not as fast as they had expected and instead of alighting at Fredericton, Col. Leckie decided to drop on the river at Upper Kingsclear. The plane was allowed to drift two miles down the St. John River and a stop finally was made opposite Mr. Clark's house.

Took Gasoline There.

This morning Robert D. Jones local manager for the Imperial Oil Company took gasoline to the machine. Col. Leckie suggested that the plane could be allowed to drift down in the current and so reach Fredericton. Mr. Jones advised strongly against that course as dangerous and it was decided to wait for fair weather. There has been a downpour of rain all day with little prospect of the plane "hopping off" today.

Transcontinental Flight.

Col. Leckie stated this morning that there was little possibility of the large plane which will make the transcontinental flight from Halifax to the Pacific Coast, stopping at Fredericton. The intention is to make as long a flight as possible after leaving Halifax and only in the case of accident will stations like Fredericton be visited. The St. John River will be followed however, as part of the route so the people of this city and the greater part of the valley will have a view of the big plane. Col. Leckie stated that the flight would begin as soon as possible after his arrival in Halifax.

Made Good Flight.

The seaplane in which Col. Leckie and Major Hobbs are making the flight to Halifax is slightly different from the planes which alighted here on flights from Halifax to Roberval, Que., and Montreal. A good flight was made yesterday. Montreal was left at noon and the first stop made at Kingsclear about dark. It is believed that the balance of the flight can be made in three hours. Under the weather conditions Wednesday the performance of the plane was excellent.

Col. Leckie has been here on previous flights.

Parent-Embleton.

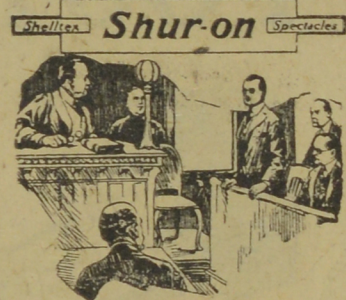

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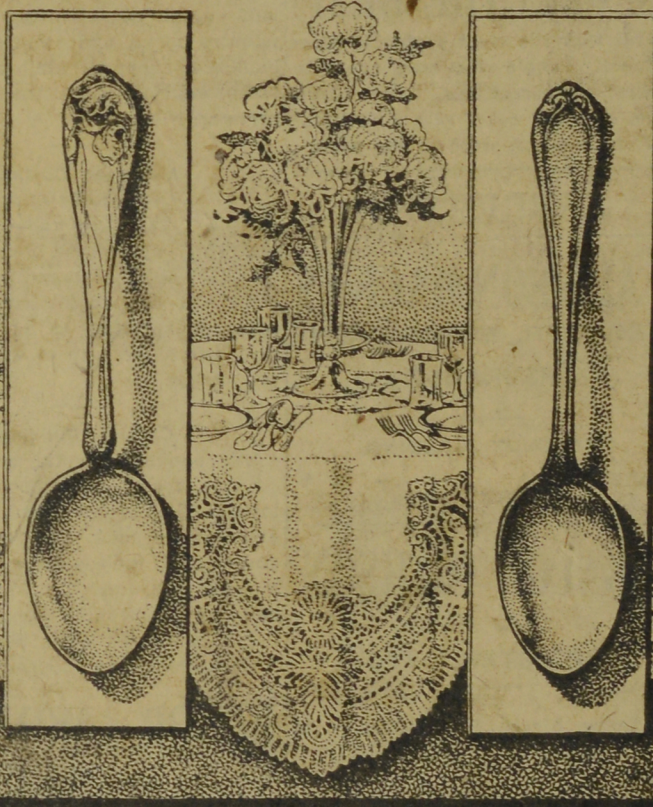
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
