## SHOULD BE LOOKED INTO

Mr. Archie B. McCoig, M. P. for Kent, addressing a gathering of farmers at Paincourt on Labor Day, says the Toronto Globe, dealt with a matter which should command the immediate attention of the Dominion Government and the management of the Canadian National Railways system. The member for Kent stated that Mr. A. DeWitt Foster former Conservative member of Parliament who was asked for his resignation by Sir Robert Borden following investigation of his conduct in purchasing horses for the Government for overseas use during war time is employed as purchasing agent for the National Railways System in one of the large United States cities. Mr. McCoig maintained that if the national system is to be efficiently and properly managed—if the publicly owned and operated railway is to have an equal chance in competition with the privately owned Canadian Pacific system—it must not be made, at the public expense, the refuge for discredited politicians. Mr. McCoig's criticism says the Globe, calls for prompt action on the part of the public representatives in charge of the management of the National Railways. Positions of emolument and responsibility on the staff of the people's railway must not be used to pay political debts, as apparently was the case during the regime of Mackenzie and Mann. Mr. Foster retired from Parliament in disgrace following the findings of Mr. Justice Davidson, the Royal Commissioner who investigated his participation in the notorious horse deals in Nova Scotia. Shortly thereafter he was appointed to a position in the employ of the then Canadian Northern Railway. If he has no better claim to the position he continues to hold on the railway under national control than that of an out-of-work politician he should be retired from the service.

Mr. Foster who won fame in connection with war horses of ancient vintage is now holding down a soft job in Chicago. Quite frequently he hobs into the limelight as was the case a few days ago when he turned up at the Michigan State fair and "spoke as the representative of Canada on Canadian Day". He is reported to have said that the American and Canadian farmers were driving the "to hell with work" spirit off the face of the continent. He went on to say that "the lessons of honor and duty are being taught in the rural districts of both countries, which is a shaft of light across the murky industrial horizon". The ex-Tory M. P. does not appear to have given his audience at the fair the benefit of his experience in the horse trading game. Although Mr. Foster was driven from Parliament in disgrace he evidently still enjoys the confidence of the government at Ottawa and no doubt it was with the full authority of that government that he presumed to speak for Canadians on Canadian Day at the Michigan State fair. The "to hell with work" spirit has evidently been strong with Mr. Foster ever since he was kicked out of Parliament.

American newspapers state that the Republican victory in Maine is a sure indication of a sweep for that party in the presidential elections in November the New York Herald says:

march of Republican voters from the East, North and West to a great and glorious national triumph."

Industrial development in Western Canada is proceeding at a rate little appreciated by people in other parts of the Dominion. The Provincial Governments in the Prairie Provinces are realizing as never before the potentialities of their natural resources. Today there are more than 700 members of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association located west of the Great Lakes, whereas twenty years ago there was not one. The July issue of Industrial Canada points out that certain lines of industry are gradually transferring a considerable part, and in many cases the chief part of their activities to Western Canada.

Like hables and chickens, oysters are now being raised in incubators, and a promise is held out to the lovers of these bivalves that the waning natural supply of the oyster crop may be saved by this new method of cultivation. W. F. Wells, biologist and sanitarian of the New York State Conservation Commission, originated the plan of raising oysters in incubators, his device consisting of a goldfish bowl, which prevents the minute forms of the baby oysters from slipping away when the water is changed a tragedy which happened in previous experiments of this kind.

Halifax Chronicle: The head of the "One Big Union" in Alberta has been "caught out" in One Big Lie. His yarn about receiving a cablegram from the President of the Miners' Federation of Great Britain was made out of whole cloth. sition caucus is scheduled to take place soon, the time and location to be determined largely on whether or not there will be an election in October or in November.

It is also reported that Hon. James Murray will resign from the leadership of the opposition and will be succeeded by Hon. Dr. Baxter. This action it is said has been determined by a demand from many centres that Mr. Murray make way for a new leader.

It will be recalled that at a Conservative convention held in the Seaman's Institute last year, the question of leadership, along with a hydro-electric policy, agitated the minds and tried the patience of the opposition without any definite result.

A feature of the opposition campaign it is asserted in advice from Sussex will be that Conservatives will offer as United Farmers in several constituencies. Premier Meighen is said to be flatly opposed to these tactics so far as federal politics is concerned. Sussex also advised that George B. Jones will not be a candidate for provincial honors again, but will enter the federal arena at the next general election.

Nearly all the present supporters of the provincial government will be candidates in the next general election and some farmer and labor candidates. On the whole, the provincial situation promises interesting developments within a short time.

## EXPLOSION IN N. Y. TODAY NEAR MORGAN'S

Eighteen Reported Killed—Bomb Believed to Be Thrown From Passing Automobile—All is Confusion.

New York, Sept. 16—The stock exchange closed about noon today when an explosion supposed by many to be of anarchistic origin occurred near the building of J. P. Morgan & Co. and the stock exchange building.

Everything is in a state of confusion but the facts thus far known are as follows:

An explosion evidently premeditated took place on the Broad street side of the Morgan Building. It blew out that side of the building completely. It blew out all the glass windows of the stock exchange on the opposite side of Broad street also a good deal of the roof of the stock exchange and some of the windows on the New st. side. Police are now in control and no one can get near. It is reported none of Morgan's partners are killed and that eight people are killed and a good many injured. The injured include people who were passing on the st.

The force of the explosion is shown by the hurling of a piece of iron through windows of S. W. Swenson on the thirteenth floor of 61 Broadway. The missile was a piece of cast iron about one pound in weight and from appearance might have been a portion of a bomb. It is learned fifteen people have been killed. Belief is the explosion was caused by a bomb thrown from a passing automobile.

## WHISKEY HAS BECOME SCARCE IN BRITAIN

London, Sept. 16—There has been such a rush to export whiskey to the United States within the past fortnight that whiskey has become much scarcer in the United Kingdom and prices are rising. Up to this time, since Prohibition, British distillers had refused to export to the United States, but the ban has been lifted and whiskey is now going to America in considerable quantities for sale in the drug stores "for medicinal purposes."

Liquor dealers here say that business has fallen off fifteen per cent. because customers are refusing to pay the attendant price increase. The retail rate is three dollars a bottle.

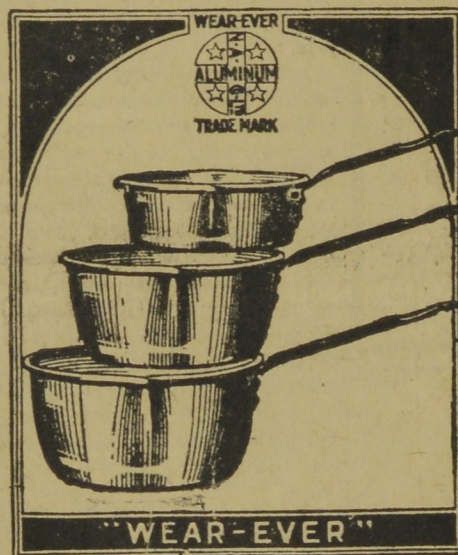

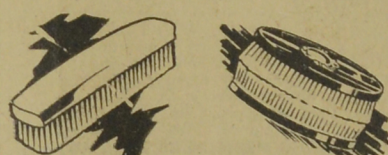

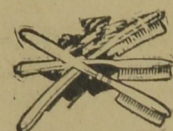
