## WINNIPEG MAKES STRONG APPEAL FOR PROTECTION

Tariff Commission in Session There Wednesday—R. A. Pringle

K. C., Told Commission That Textile Industries Preferred Sudden Death to Prolonged Agony—Necessity For Increased Revenue Strongly Urged—Statistics of Cotton and Woollen Industries Filed.

Winnipeg, Sept. 15—Without exception representatives of various Winnipeg industries told the tariff commissioners this morning that their factories would have to close if the tariff protection afforded them by the customs duties were to cease. United States competitors could undersell them because with quantity production in an immensely greater market they had a smaller overhead cost per unit of production and therefore could produce more cheaply. They had also the advantage of a shorter winter, of free raw materials, which Canadians had to import from the United States against duties in many cases.

W. A. Lawson represented the Bemis Bros. Bag Company an American concern with a Winnipeg branch of which he was manager.

The Winnipeg plant had been built in 1906 because the firm was unable to do any business in western Canada because of the Canadian tariff. If things were allowed to come into Canada free of duty it would be necessary for them to close their plant in Winnipeg and supply the market from the American branches.

The American branch in Minneapolis could manufacture the bags from \$4 to \$5 a thousand cheaper in Canada partly because of the difference in cost and partly because they cut the overhead charges by quantity production. For example, he cited one quality of bags whose manufacturing cost in Minneapolis was \$9.61 as against \$14.28 a thousand in Winnipeg.

J. H. Parkhill, of the Parkhill Bed Company; J. S. Menzies, representing the combined wood and iron working industries of Winnipeg with a total capital of \$3,280,000; J. E. Vogan, representing eight shirt and overall factories of Winnipeg and W. J. Wilson, representing western firms engaged in sheet metal manufacture and employing 500 men, said these companies could continue only under protection of their product.

### Textile Industry

Winnipeg, Sept. 15—"If we are to die, far better would it be to have sudden death rather than prolonged agony," said A. A. Pringle, K. C., counsel for the textile interests of the dominion in continuing arguments before the tariff commission prior to its adjournment at noon, in referring to the platform of the Farmers' Party, which predicts free trade in five years.
